The majority of delegates who attended in person were from Queensland.

We heard presentations from online speakers, performers and members of parliament. Due to COVID many could not travel to Longreach but were still able to provide input. I thought the attendance of our online delegates worked very well; we could hear their voices easily and some of the settings they were in (e.g. the car) only added to the uniqueness of this event.

Motions about issues relevant to ICPA members were presented and all were carried at conference. Some of the topics these motions covered included assistance for geographically isolated students, tertiary education access and support, early childhood services being expanded or restarted and communications problems, to name just a few. A floor motion was presented right at the end of conference which will urgently pursue the National Code for boarding students. We heard heartbreaking stories of families not being able to see, or support, their kids when they attend boarding school in another state. COVID has really been so hard for some families and one family was unable to see their son get his school captain badge, even with the best travel plans and being fully vaccinated.

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Following afternoon tea on day one we heard journalist Jayne Cuddihy, presenting on the couch, a Q & A session with Federal ICPA Life Members. It was lovely to listen to their stories, the fun they have had, what they have gained out of ICPA and what keeps them passionate about the organisation, after all this time. Jayne is presenting a series of podcasts with other life members who were not at conference.

We discovered the wonderful recent achievements of Federal ICPA, including the new website. The website is vibrant, informative, interactive and has a section for branches also It can be found at www.icpa.com.au

Presidents' presented their reports over the two days and it was great to hear the different issues and victories each state has dealt with lately. Federal conference will be held in Perth in 2022.

After a full formal day of conference proceedings we all travelled by courtesy bus to a venue called "Smithy's", on the Thomson River, and had a beautiful meal with live music and dancing. An auction was held to raise funds for the ICPA, which was well supported.
