My speech focused on the theme that it is impossible to have sustainable development without families and that you cannot attract or retain families if they can not access adequate options for their children to be educated and thrive.

Also in Darwin, and on the same week, ICPA NT hosted the Federal Conference. "Unique Land – Unique Learning" the theme for this year's Federal Conference, perfectly sums up the geographically isolated education scenario. Thank you to Convenor Sue Wilson and her hardworking team for hosting a truly amazing event. And thank you to the huge turnout of NT members - we hope you enjoyed it as much as we enjoyed having you there.

Conference (Federal and State) have at least three core activities: 1) Reporting 2) Motions and 3) Networking.

REPORTING – The reports and updates from Federal Council and the State Presidents set the scene. It reminds us how different we all are but how connected and united by the same ultimate challenge – educating our children in geographical isolated situations. Hearing from other stakeholders provides food for thought, further useful information, and a point of contact to follow up, where need be.

MOTIONS – these are your voices, your concerns, and issues. When a motion is voted against, it is often not because one disagrees that it is important or worthy, but because it is not within the scope of those being asked to deal with it, or that it would take away from other benefits already gained. No motion, regardless of the vote, ever actually loses. By presenting it at conference, awareness of it is raised, understanding of it is increased, and it is officially recorded. It

is also highly likely that someone in the room, will have the connections or ability to assist to help take the issue further or through to completion. Conference is about all the people in the room (and those reading later) – not just the incumbent Council team.

NETWORKING – this is probably the most valuable. The above two components provide much of the stimulus for networking to occur. The finding of common ground and points of mutual interest; or those we wish to learn more about; or to those we wish to share our individual story with. Or just reconnecting with friends and making new ones.

For the first time in a long time, NT is without representation at Federal level. Our conditions and environment are unique. I urge you to consider Federal Council.

If not tapping yourself on the shoulder, who could you encourage to take on the task. The journey of a Councillor or Committee member at any level of ICPA is richly rewarding. I offer you my unconditional support.

Enjoy reading the wonderful stories, pictures, advertisements and snippets in this edition of Down the Track, once again so beautifully crafted and put together by our talented editor, Annika. Thank you and thank you to everyone for your contributions.

My first report as the 2023 branch president and what an honour it is!

Firstly I'd like to acknowledge and thank all of our members, past and present for the continuous amount of hours and commitment that everyone dedicates to the equity of education for our rural and remote children. For volunteering your time, for attending meetings and most importantly bringing your concerns to us.

You are the ones living with these challenges every day and we hope in time we can improve these challenges together.

I would like to thank our amazing outgoing committee, the time and commitment that you have all put in throughout the year has been phenomenal. We are forever grateful to you all.

I would like to also welcome our newly elected committee; I'm excited for the year ahead with you all and look forward to what we can achieve this year together.

When I came to experience and live the rural and remote lifestyle, 8 years ago from our travelling business, Murranji Water Drilling our son, Heath, was only a sweet little 1 year old. With our business taking us travelling across multiple states/territories to cattle stations, meeting families from all walks it was then when I realised firsthand the struggles families and children face when accessing equity in education.

Being a city girl and growing up on the Gold Coast I attended mainstream schools. I was totally oblivious to the hurdles, the exclusions and the challenges that lay ahead of me when it came to education and bringing my children up in Outback Australia.

Facing these struggles is how I first found out about ICPA and the incredible work they do. The support network, the volunteers and advice I have received from the ICPA team and seeing how passionate everyone is I knew instantly

this was something I wanted to be a part of.

time ether. ICPA NT Alice Springs Branch have been lucky enough to receive so much support from sponsors over the years and we are incredibly grateful! We cannot thank you all enough for your donations.

In 2022 we had the support from Red Centre Campdraft, Aileron Bush Club, Govies Muster and Barkly Rodeo; these associations gave our branch the opportunity to host fundraisers at their events, and we thank each of them. We also received a wonderful donation from Bluedust NT that went towards grants for our Branch, and we thank you for your generous donation.

Thank you to Northern Territory Cattleman's Association for allowing us to hold an auction at your gala dinner on the 17th of March, we will be forever grateful for this opportunity, and we were completely blown away by the generosity of the sponsors who came on board to support the auction. The sponsors included the following, Reaqua and Thinkwater Alice Springs who donated a solar system for a bore complete with installation; Murranji Water Drilling who donated a stock water bore; Olsens for donating their wonderful products; and Elders Alice Springs along with Polaris, who donatied a buggy! It gives me goosebumps thinking of the generosity of these companies.

Families are out of pocket \$60-\$80k a year to educate their geographically isolated children. We need to support these families more to retain them to our regions as we are seeing too many people leave Central Australia due to the high costs of education and access to health services. Funds raised from the auction will go towards supporting our families through a variety of programs and initiatives including but not limited to; playgroups for children under 5 who cannot access any form of early learning until they enrol in school, Grants to assist our families with the excessively high costs of education, provide sports activities to give our students the opportunity to try team sports and of course to continue our core work of advocating for change at a government level.

Our branch, committee and members have been busy these past months with so many wonderful things to share. We have recently partnered with Charles Darwin University to offer a Certificate 4 in Education Support for Home Tutors in the Northern Territory. This will make a massive difference for families to not only help recruit and retain home tutors but it creates training pathways for future territory teachers.

Connellan Airways Trust and Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR) have been supporting our home tutor training programs by kindly funding

lifesaving first aid training for 2 years. This is keeping our members and their families up to date with current measures, providing new knowledge and instilling confidence in their ability to react quickly and calmly in an emergency situation. Our families are extremely grateful that you recognize the importance of this training and continuing to keep our rural families safe.

I express concern that our geographically isolated children under five years of age and their families are still without access to early learning initiatives across Central Australia. As a community we have advocated for this for decades without any change, at a government level, early learning isn't just about children's development, it's also about supporting families, families who live thousands of kms away from their own networks and live very isolated lives. We are tired of families leaving our community due to them not being able to access these services.

This year we are trying to close that gap. By partnering with RaisEducation we will be delivering these muchneeded services to our community. We are so very grateful to Variety the Children's Charity and the Community Benefit Fund for supporting this cause and funding this initiative. We are looking forward to rolling out nine playgroups this year and seeing the difference this interaction makes on our young people. We need more support to be able to continue providing a regular ongoing service! \$1500 will fund one playgroup for our community, how many would the Northern Territory Government like to fund?

In this day and age our families are still out of pocket for internet costs for delivering education to their children. Why is this still happening? How can it change? Access to reliable internet is fundamental to achieving equitable quality education. How can a student learn when the internet is dropping out every couple of minutes? How can a child stay focused when the screen



keeps freezing? Families are out of pocket hundreds of dollars a month for internet costs. We are directly asking the Department of Education and the NT Government to find a better solution.

Life in remote Outback Australia is hard but magnificent, if we work together, we can achieve great things! Introducing Jervois Station's newest ringer

National Farm Safety Education Fund: Improving Farm Safety Practices

Safer Stations

The Northern Territory Cattlemen's Association recognise the importance of station safety for all that live and work on remote properties in the Northern Territory; and we were fortunate enough to be granted one of nine nation wide projects worth \$1.6 million to Improve Farm Safety Practices as part of the National Farm Safety Education Fund.

"Farm safety doesn't need to be complicated, expensive, or inconvenient. It's about making choices. A few small changes to how things are done around the farm can make a big difference"

The NTCA has worked with the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry to utilise this Commonwealths support to ensure stations are a safe place, and workers can get home to their families at the end of each day.


Our project is designed to educate the next generation about the importance of on-station safety. And reduce the workload of managers or owners to ensure worksites are safe for all.

To target the next generation, four engaging videos have been produced along with an activity workbook to make the learning experience fun and interactive.

In order to simplify and reduce costs for managers or station owners, we have also complied a Work Health and Safety guide to the most recent legislation and best practices.

All of which can be found on the Northern Territory Cattlemen's Association website under the Safer Stations project, or a hard copy can be supplied upon request.

Ultimately our goal is to ensure businesses have the best practices in place to ensure the safety of all that live and work in these remote locations. Its also important for us and the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry that children learn these vital safety skills from a young age and carry them on into the future.







ANTON LANZARIN | Coodardie Station, Mataranka

Hi, my name is Anton, and I'm about to start my second year at BTC (Blackheath and Thornburgh College) in eighth grade.

BTC is a small day and boarding school in Charters towers with around 70 boys boarding and around 350 kids in the school. I'll share a bit about my first year in boarding and the things I found most helpful to me.

Probably the most important thing was making good friends that you can rely on. At the start of the year, I didn't talk much to other people as much as everyone else which wasn't too good. You end up missing home so much more than if you're hanging out with your friends or busy doing stuff.

Once I first got to boarding, I felt like I was never going to fit in, and everyone seemed so different from me. But once I got to know them more there were kids that were similar to me. The people I don't particularly like don't have much to do with me, nor I with them - if we do interact, it usually is brief and then we go our separate ways.

The opportunities I get in boarding school are much more than what I could do in Mataranka. For sports, we had to travel an hour every time we had a game or training where as at boarding school, everything is there.

Another thing that helped me was having family close by to go to on the weekend if I needed a break from boarding.

Hello my name is Charlie Cook, I am Year 7 attending St Joesphs Nudgee College Boarding School in Brisbane. This has been quite a change for me moving from the station into the big city. It has always been just my brother Blake and I, now I am now living with 300 other boys at the Boarding House. I have been able to make friends with other station boys from all over Queensland and Australia.

Nudgee has lots of training fields and open spaces which makes me feel at home. After school we can go to the oval and play rugby which is one of my favourite things to do with my friends. Mr Brealy, the O'Brien House Deans, House Mum Tracey, Mr Sedour and Fabio are really kind to me and take us all out to the beach to surf, have bonfires and overnight campouts, BBQs, take us to the Reds and Broncs matches at Suncorp stadium and also make sure I keep my room very very tidy.

While I miss the station life, there are so many new opportunities at Nudgee. I enjoy playing rugby union, cricket, cattle club, swimming, guitar lessons, boxing and pony club. My best moment so far was receiving the Cricket Team Man Award 2023 for my team and getting into the blues rugby squad.

I am very grateful to the ICPA Katherine Branch for assisting me to attend this great school.

We play home games, and a lot of games with Townsville teams, so I get to travel a lot on weekends.

In my team we have kids from every school around Charters Towers, so I've been able to make friends at different schools too, and our Coach gives everyone a chance to play. ICPA NT ZOETIS AUSTRALIA "PASTORAL INDUSTRY" STUDENT GRANT



Speaking from experience, tertiary study far from home has an intimidating sense of 'now or never'. If you want to keep your roots in the outback, there is a lot of stress to face. The combination of huge travel costs, homesickness, and the age cut-off for independent youth allowance creates enormous financial and emotional pressure for remote students to choose the 'right' degree and complete it as quickly as possible. It makes the idea of changing courses mid-way through university almost unthinkable. On the other hand, university is also an intoxicating experience. You comprehend that it is, in-fact, not normal to travel 400Km from a cattle station to see a specialist or 120Km to get groceries at high prices. There is a pharmacist or fuel 5 minutes away no matter where in the city you are. You can play sport every weekend without travelling for 2 hours or seek financial, legal, dietary or psychological advice by popping down the street.

As a result, some that choose to travel to university don't desire to return to the dearth of resources present in the outback, their valuable tertiary education is lured away from remote areas by the abundant urban opportunities, leading to fewer resources in the outback... and the vicious cycle continues.

In late 2021, I considered this conundrum, and the part I was playing in it... and changed my degree mid-way. I decided to bring accounting and financial skills back to the outback, and to friends and family that raised me and supported me across my education and life. I am now

completing a Bachelor of Commerce, majoring in accounting and management. I know from firsthand experience that many properties must outsource accountancy interstate to firms that have minimal experience with the unique challenges that living in the NT poses. I feel that with a tertiary education and some more experience under my belt, I can offer accounting and business management consultancy for stations from the perspective of one who has lived and breathed 'cattle station' since before I could walk. I also would eventually like to be involved in financial education services for remote schools to help students develop money-management skills without needing to travel interstate for an urban education.

The decision to change was stressful, and expensive. Thankfully, I felt able to make this commitment thanks to the financial assistance I have received from organisations like the ICPA.

The ICPA has been present throughout my life, thanks to my mother's membership with our local branch. She has been a fierce campaigner for kids from the bush, to give them the opportunity to attend tertiary study despite geographic hurdles and to support them in learning skills that will give the next generation of rural and remote children better access to resources than we ever did.

Emotional stress aside, the financial strain of distant study is enough to discourage many potential students. Although independent youth allowance is helpful, it doesn't account for covering the bulk costs of university. It is these costs that I am asking assistance in paying. Post-COVID, flights have increased to over \$400.00 each way, meaning returning home for breaks is an expensive choice. The university's student services and amenities fee (SSAF) is a compulsory annual fee of \$326.00, which is quite a hit when on a student's budget. Textbooks are another beast entirely. The total cost of my textbooks for my Semester 1 classes comes to \$599.00. As a result, I have previously had to opt for substantially cheaper, and substantially sub-par alternatives, such as borrowing a friend's textbook, which limits when I can access it, or (allegedly) downloading bootleg pdfs, which do not allow for access to connected resources and are often missing pages. Finally, there is the cost of transport to and from university. While I can ride my bike to class occasionally, this is often unfeasible due to rain. As a result, I also use a 100-day public transport pass over winter, priced at \$276.00 for a concession holder. These costs stretch my student's budget heavily, and I am thus seeking financial assistance through the Zoetis Australia Pastoral Industry Student Grant.





630km southwest from the nearest town, down the Duncan Road is These carnivals aren't just like your average carnival, ours were a 4000sq km station called Mistake Creek on the Northern Territory and Western Australian border; this place is my home and my family have managed and lived here for 28 years.

As I was growing up, I had been homed schooled. So, I was at home a lot more than an average town kid would be. As a bush kid I learnt my education over the computer, we called this IDL. this was the only time that I could see my teacher and classmates, and this would happen every week day for half an hour.

As a young girl I had the freedom to adventure out, go to work or ride my horse after school which would finish at 1:00pm and on the weekends, so I had loads of fun. Being homed schooled thought me not to take things for granted and to enjoy the time that I have with my family.

When I was in transition (the grade before year 1 and after preschool) I had to repeat as I had trouble with learning. Because my Mum taught me school she picked up that I was having trouble. Mum tried explaining to the teachers that I was having difficulty with my work, but they just wouldn't listen to her.

Once I got to Year 4, Mum went out of her way and took me to an Irlen Syndrome and Dyslexia tester, and it turned out that for the last seven years I was struggling to read and process words, and was diagnosed with both.

Dyslexia being a learning disorder that involves difficulty reading due to problems identifying speech sounds and learning how they relate to letters and words, and Irlen Syndrome suggesting that the brain is unable to properly process visual information from the eyes because of sensitivity to certain wavelengths of light.

I had to travel to Darwin every couple of weeks to do further testing, I even had to get glasses with pink lenses to help stop the words jumping everywhere on the page, and as I got older this changed to blue.

Once the school found out about it, they had coloured paper for me to help me with my learning, they also made sure that I could understand my work. When I hear the saying a 'mother knows when there's something wrong with their child' I believe that is true.

Because of that my Mum went out of her way to help me and I am so thankful that she has done this for me, if not for her I would be lost and still struggling

Each year we would travel in to town and have our sports day and swimming carnivals - this was one of my highlights of my homeschooling years, it was an opportunity for all of us to come together.

when everyone's family's came like grandparents, cousins, uncles and aunties, all the kids got in and done every activity and had loads of fun - the parents would even do a relay against the past students and year 9s. We have two houses; Bushfires and Cyclones so it was the most fun that a kid could have especially when everyone dressed up, even the parents.

The year of 2017 I started boarding school at St Ursula's College in Yeppoon Queensland, so I was a very long way from home, like I mean 3,168.9 km away from home. I was terrified for my life; I didn't know anyone, I didn't even know if I was going to make friends. The first couple of weeks I was not too sure how everything worked, I didn't know what a timetable was for the class times or how to get to the rooms. I didn't know what homework was and I would always get in to trouble if I didn't do it, no one ever explained to me what I had to do for it, so I had to find out what that meant by myself.

I was always scared to read things out to my class as I was a very shy person and I would get upset when I couldn't read aloud when I would mess up because of my dyslexia, so I have to work as twice as hard as everyone else. I was always scared to tell people about my disability, and it was like that for the first 2 years of high school, and I was starting to struggle again because the teachers didn't know about it.

Once I started to tell them they provided me with coloured blue paper which helped me a lot and I felt more confident with myself. Some teachers don't understand that it does take me awhile to process things in my head and over the last 6 years I've found out that I learn so much quicker when I'm doing hands on work. This is because I am more passionate about things I do when there is no writing and reading, and cause of this ability I got offered an apprenticeship and this makes me feel like I can do anything that I want, that I put my mind to and just because I have this disability, I can do more and see things in a different perspective.

Over the six years I have spent in Yeppoon I still miss home and all the lovely features about it - the sun on my skin when working in the yards, chasing cattle across the paddocks and most of all having time with my family. I have learnt so much and have developed into the person I am today because of these two places. Yeppoon has taught me that I am a thoughtful and caring person and can do anything that I put my mind to. My home has taught that I can be independent, strong and a hard worker. Both places have offered me many opportunities to push myself to the limit.



NORTHERN TERRITORY PRESIDENT'S REPORT ICPA Federal Conference 2023 Moira Lanzarin

"Unique Land – Unique Learning"

It is with immense pride and humility that I take my turn to stand before you today as NT President and welcome you to our unique and extraordinary Territory. NT people please wave your hand. We offer you all a very warm welcome to our beautiful northern capital. My sincere thank you to our hardworking convening committee, ably led by the dynamic Sue Wilson, and the equally impressive Federal Council and generous sponsors for making this amazing gathering possible.

"Unique Land – Unique Learning" perfectly sums up the geographically isolated education scenario. I am excited about our time ahead and I trust so are you.

ICPA is an endurance relay of epic proportions. Every person doing their bit – doing what they can, when they can. Together, carrying on. 41 and 1/2 years in the NT, 53 years Federally. These are impressive figures. Even more impressive because it is done from a 100% volunteer work base. By the very nature of our charter working for geographically isolated children and families - there will always be a need for ICPA. We cannot change the geography, and nor would we want to. I am proud of every one of you and what we collectively stand for and have achieved.

Every three years, the NT holds our State Annual Conference and AGM virtually. This year it was via Zoom. "Advocacy from Anywhere" certainly proved to be correct. Our conference delegates rallied together for vigorous but respectful debate to ensure issues important to their children's education were heard and actioned. Technology and communication systems have come such a long way. It was great to clearly see so many beautiful faces, joining from many diverse settings and hearing their crisp and clear voices. Thank you to those who persisted despite technical glitches and dropouts and learnt alongside us as we all navigated online voting and correct governance processes. Thank you to Federal President Alana and then Queensland President Louise Martin for assisting with due process when needed. Hosting and participating in a virtual conference can be challenging - so it was very humbling and pleasing to hear and see that the conference was not only efficient and effective but also enjoyable.

Enjoyable and important are key factors I believe to the success of ICPA – they are part of the WHY that keeps people volunteering and working hard to achieve better opportunities and outcomes for our children.

Having two of our new Councillors plus Treasurer and Secretary, join with us face to face for the first time at our AGM, was so valuable. Other Councillors actively participated virtually. I confess some envy as I hear about other Councils regularly all coming together for full face to face meetings. In my time on NT Council, this has not been achieved. But as said before, the NT has its unique characteristics – one of which is us being spread very thin across a very large chunk of land. The day after conference, State Council participated in a Values-based, decision-making training session led by Helen Lewis of Decision Design Hub. This is a living, evolving piece of work which will help guide us into the future, ensuring we stay relevant, focused and true to purpose. Part of the vision articulated was:

"As an Organisation we are relevant and resilient. We are persistent, strong and powerful in the voice and support we give to GI families which is positive and solution based. Our intelligence, professionalism, integrity and knowledge are respected. We are welcoming, compassionate and inclusive."

Connections, relationships, partnerships, mateship, community dynamics – looking after each other and working together. These are what makes a society and when they are working well and are positive and strong, growth and success has fertile ground to flourish. Building and strengthening relationships with members and stakeholders is important and an ongoing activity.

The NT has only three branches – Alice Springs and Katherine who are based around the respective schools of the air, and Territory Wide who is our Lones Branch. Both main branches have seen a changing of the guard as older families move through to the next stage of their education and new families enter. It is beautiful seeing these new faces grow in confidence and skill as they step up to lead and participate.

We have achieved so much and there is so much that should be celebrated and excitedly proclaimed from the roof tops. The achievements of ICPA are huge and varied. Many of the things that we simply take for granted in our everyday lives, educating our children whilst being out bush, is thanks to ICPA: All of our allowances and assistance schemes; many of our institutions; and most of the related policy. If there wasn't a door to open, we have built the door ourselves and walked through. And done so with dignity, respect, professionalism and passion.

If ICPA has a weakness, I think that is that we do not acknowledge, own and celebrate our successes anywhere near enough. We are our harshest critic and always striving for more, pushing ourselves further. As an organisation we need to be better at celebrating and acknowledging our wins and kinder to ourselves regarding our contribution. So, in amongst the rush, please take the time to reflect and acknowledge the efforts and accomplishments – not only of ICPA, and others but also yourself.

The past 12 months has been filled with achievements. My ICPA calendar tells me ICPA NT State Council have participated in 98 meetings and this is not counting individual delegation meetings. Geographically isolated families across the NT are having their voices heard, their stories and issues listened to, and action is occurring.

Just yesterday, I represented ICPA and addressed the Developing North Australia Conference, also being held here in Darwin this week. My message was simple.

For a sustainable north Australia, there must be families.
To keep and retain families they need to have good education options for their children (and communications, health and roads).
If families are supported, businesses and communities will prosper with far greater resilience and sustainability.

The core top 5 issues for Northern Territory ICPA have remained unchanged for some time. 1.) Improve the NT Student Assistance Schemes for Geographically Isolated families. 2.) Maintenance funding & new funding for Mobile Playgroups to reach geographically isolated children (five years and under). 3.) Early identification, diagnosis, and management of special learning needs. 4.) Continued improvements to accessing affordable and reliable technology and communication systems for geographically isolated education purposes. 5.) A Distance Education Teaching Allowance (DETA) to recognise the substantial financial costs associated with the compulsory role of the remote home tutor. We are making progress but there is still more to be done. recognition of the Home Tutor for RPL and the commencement of certificate 3, 4 or diploma of Ed, via Charles Darwin University, whilst they are teaching in the home classroom. Congratulations to our first group of Home Tutors undergoing training through Charles Darwin University whilst working full time teaching our bush kids and being recognised for their existing experience in the education journey. This is an exciting pathway, not only for our own children and home tutors but also working towards contributing to solving the national teacher shortage, especially in regional areas.

Thru partnership with St Johns, at no-cost to families, first aid training has been able to be made available to home tutors. We are also working closely with Early Childhood Australia (ECA) who are keen to collaborate with ICPA to improve access to early education for young children in remote areas through policy and program reforms.

Strong collaborations and reconnections with NT Cattlemen's Assoc (NTCA) are occurring and we are currently exploring ways as to how we can work more effectively together. Our geographic landscape and many of our membership overlaps.

These achievements are due to the persistent hardwork, and passionate commitment of our strong and amazing Councillors (State and Federal), past and present, and thanks to our membership. #TeamICPA. It is a real pleasure and privilege to work with and for you. To my fellow state Councillors, you are a delight to work with. My congratulations and admiration to Alana and your Federal Council team. Well done.

Thank you for joining us today and I trust that you will find the conference enjoyable and productive and your time in the NT memorable and pleasant.



Many thanks to the Alice Springs Branch and State Council for supporting my attendance at the Federal ICPA Conference in Darwin this year. It was great to reconnect with ICPA in this way and to see the passion in its membership from all over Australia that keeps this great organisation powering on.

The NT State Council did a fantastic job of convening the conference- the location for the conference and its functions were well chosen, showcasing our lovely Top End. I am sure the delegates from down south appreciated the 'warm conference weather' for a change.

I particularly liked hearing from our own locals – the Sullivan Family (or part thereof) of the kids and where they are at now and their education journeys and their appreciation of mum Sally being committed to ICPA for all those years. The added touch of having the conference opened by students from the Haileybury Rendall School singing the National Anthem cemented the reason why we are all here - for the kids.

I would recommend that all members attend at least onc conference (whether it be a State or Federal one) early in their membership life, so they can truly appreciate what ICPA does and why we are here.
