

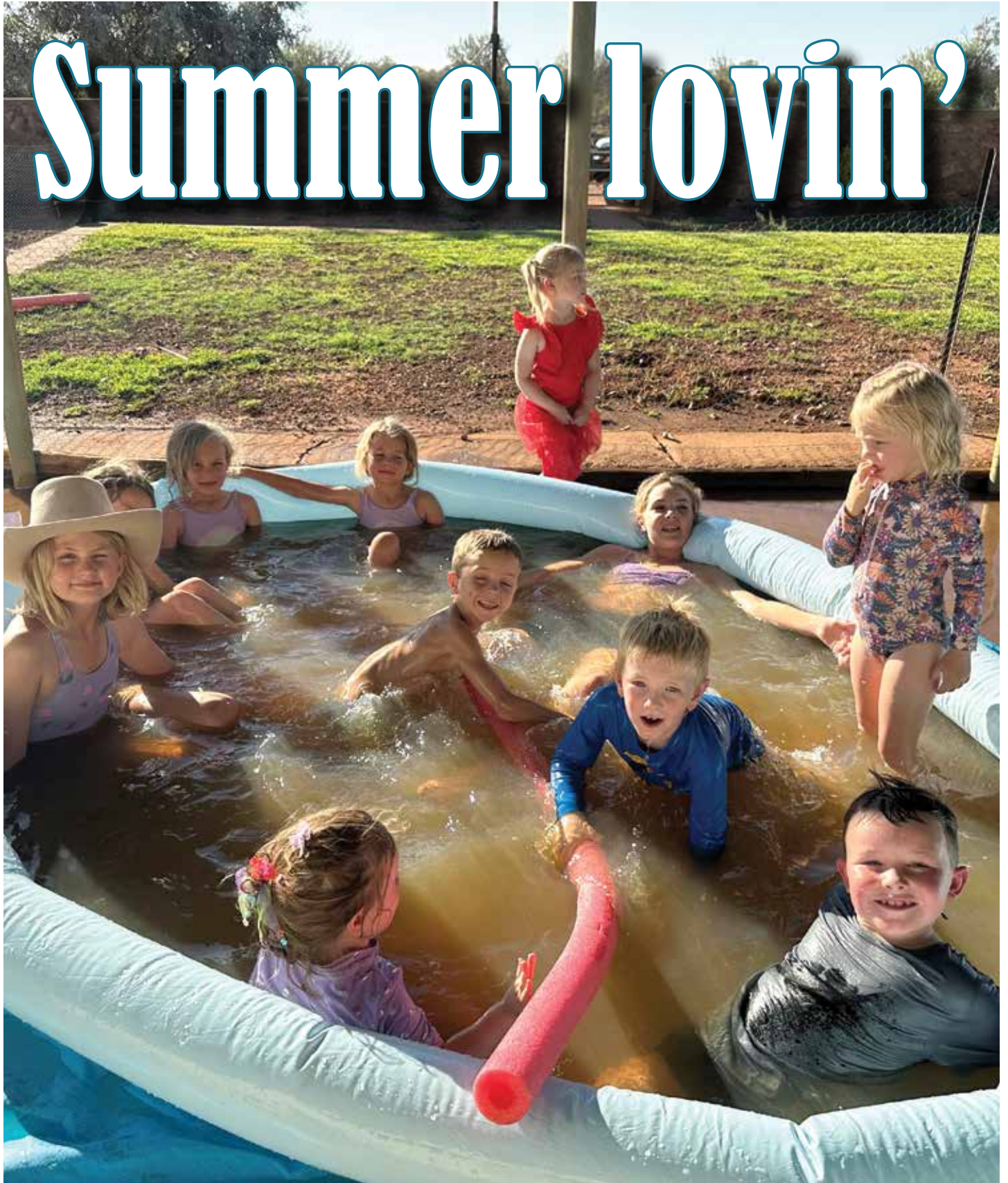

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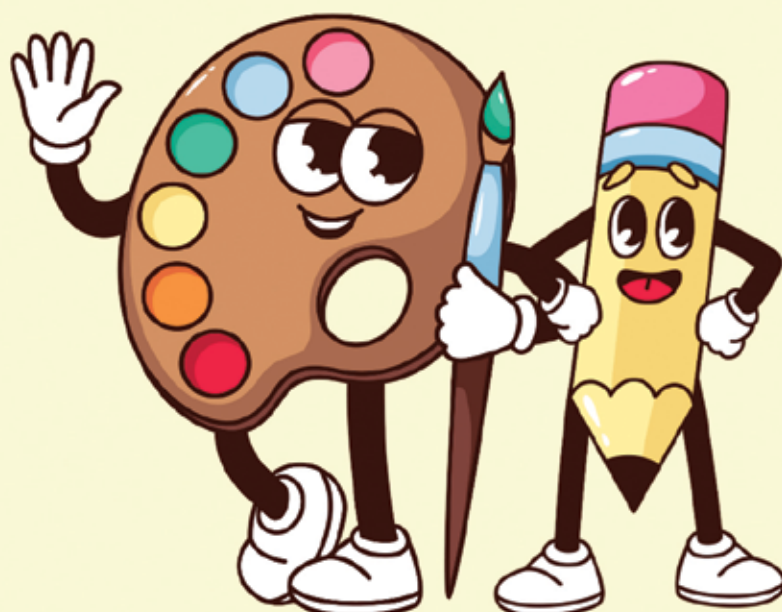

Jackie Williams Teaching Career

As the 2024 school year draws to a close, so does my career spanning more than 43 years in public education.

Following the completion of a three-year Diploma of Teaching, I commenced my teaching career on June 29th, 1981. I was a timid and diminutive 20-year-old, assigned to a class of 31 Year 6/7s at Hamley Bridge Primary School. I survived, and went on to accept contract positions in a number of locations including Moonta, Cambrai, Karoonda and a couple of city schools.

In 1985 I was appointed to a permanent position at Willsden Primary School in Port Augusta, where I enjoyed three amazing years of professional growth. Port Augusta in the 80s was a thriving city and I was so fortunate to have made many lifelong friendships during my

time there.

I returned to Adelaide in 1988, where I was appointed to Hallett Cove R-10 School. This was a newly opened, rapidly growing and progressive location, and I was certainly kept on my toes. My passion for literacy improvement and curriculum development enabled me to dabble in some entry level leadership as Curriculum Coordinator in 1995. This in turn led to another curriculum leadership position at Glenelg PS. These ten years represented an era of curriculum renewal in South Australian education, and I feel privileged to have been so involved in this work.

In 1998, I was appointed as principal for the first time, at Mt Bryan School, north of Burra. I can so vividly recall driving up the Barrier Highway, full of fear and self-doubt, wondering

what on earth I was doing and why I had been appointed in the first place. Mt Bryan had an enrolment of 27 when I arrived and has long since closed. I learnt an incredible amount in this role, and from the staff and community around me.

Two years later I was appointed as principal to Riverton Primary School, where I remained for nine years. What an incredible experience! I loved every minute of my time working in such an amazing community. I have so many fond memories of the students, staff and community, and enjoy catching up on news as those students grow up and move onto careers of their own. My daughter completed her schooling in Riverton and when she was ready to go to university, it was time for me to return to Adelaide. In 2009 I was appointed as principal to Sheidow Park School, south of Adelaide. Once again, I was fortunate to have been able to work in a school with great teachers, a supportive community and enthusiastic students. However, in March of that year, on a chance visit to Coober Pedy, I met Tony Williams. At the end of that year, I relinquished my principalship and moved to live at Mt Barry, halfway between Coober Pedy and Oodnadatta.

With luck on my side, again, I was able to secure a teaching position for two days a week at Oodnadatta Aboriginal School. This was a 100 km drive, on dirt, and thankfully I was able to stay overnight in Oodnadatta. In my first year there I provided classroom support, and then for the next four years, I taught Spanish. This opened up a world of opportunity for the students. We had a Spanish language assistant spend one term working in the school, the Spanish advisors based in Adelaide visited, we had a sis-

ter school programme with a school in Cuenca, east of Madrid, and had planned a trip to Spain, which sadly never eventuated. To this day, many of the students, now in their 20s can recall these lessons and say a few words.

In 2016, I was appointed to Coober Pedy Area School, also two days a week, a 100 km drive and an overnight stay. I taught some cooking, but most of my role was in literacy intervention. In 2018, I moved back into a part time leadership position, in intervention and support. Over this time, I led and implemented literacy improvement programmes that saw a profound improvement in the literacy skills of so many students. I also coordinated the intervention programs for students with learning difficulties. I am so pleased that it was here that I concluded my career, knowing that I had been instrumental in helping so many to achieve.

As I reflect on the last four decades, I can only be thankful that I have been able to do what I love, and to have had some positive impact on individuals, schools and communities. It has been a privilege to have worked in public education, with more than thirty of those years in rural and remote locations. Working in public education has afforded me so many opportunities, both in SA and abroad. I cannot recommend highly enough education as a career for anyone with a passion to make a difference and to support communities, and in particular rural and remote communities.



St Ann's College

St Ann's College is a non-denominational, independently owned tertiary residential college in North Adelaide that provides a supportive living and learning community for students who relocate to Adelaide to complete their tertiary studies.

At St Ann's they focus on the academic and personal development of each student, providing wellbeing and academic support. They also offer access to a range of sporting, cultural, community and social activities.

A room in St Ann's, North Adelaide, costs \$616 per week for a 34-week contract or \$20,944 per year. This cost includes the room with utilities and insurance, all meals, weekly cleaning, air-conditioning,

electricity, and Wi-Fi, along with peer-to-peer tuition and an Academic Program.

WHO CAN APPLY

To be considered for a place at St Ann's College, applicants must have a view to secure a place in either; One of Adelaide's three universities, One of Adelaide's international, national or private universities, One of Adelaide's Colleges of higher learning or TAFESA/ equivalent education provider 2025 Scholarships and bursaries are currently open, application deadline is 8 January. These awards help diverse students and support those facing challenges and your application is your canvas to showcase your potential and aspirations. Students from regional, rural, and remote areas are encouraged to apply.

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Uni Hub Spencer Gulf gives regional and rural people a chance to study university without the need to move away from home.

If you mention university study to most people, they will immediately think of the typical metropolitan university campus with its sprawling grounds, large lecture theatres and hundreds of students bustling from one building to the next.

For some people, going to university is a right of passage. It is the next step in their educational journey as they prepare for their eventual career. For others it is part of their ongoing professional development in a job they have already dedicated years towards. And for many it is a chance to switch careers and try something new.

But what happens when you don't live in a metropolitan area; or life and financial pressures don't allow the luxury of uprooting and moving closer to a university campus? What happens when you simply don't want to move away from the place you call home?

For the past five years Uni Hub Spencer Gulf has been providing regional and rural people with the chance to study university without the need to move away from home.

The Uni Hub is not a university, but it works with its university partners to deliver degrees – particularly those that address skill shortages in the region. This means students study in areas with strong job and career opportunities right in the region.

University courses are delivered by the university partners online. However, studying online can bring its own challenges. It assumes you have (1) access to decent internet, (2) a quiet space and (3) the motivation to study unsupported – and you don't need to sit down and talk to a real person at any time throughout your degree.

This is where the Uni Hub really comes into its own. Students can take advantage of the Uni Hub's four university centres – located in Kadina, Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Port Lincoln, as well as its outreach service at Roxby Downs.

Here students are provided with high-speed internet, quiet study spaces and access to staff to assist them throughout their university journey. The Uni Hub provides academic and course support for degrees offered by partner universities including enrolment support, local residential schools and tutorials, help with placements and student mentoring.

In a nutshell the Uni Hub's goal is to give students the best chance of success in their online studies. In fact, the Uni Hub is now supporting more than 300 students across its five locations.

The real measure of the Uni Hub's success is the growing number of graduates that are now working in their chosen careers in their local communities. These graduates successfully completed their degrees fields of nursing, teaching, social work, accounting and psychological science.

The next few years will see these fields of expertise expand to include graduates in engineering, allied health (physiotherapy, speech pathology, occupational therapy), business, surveying, construction and urban and regional planning – just to name a few.

And there is a strong employer demand for these graduates in the region. In fact, every Uni Hub graduate from 2023 gained employment in their new profession.

The continued growth in student numbers and courses on offer not only proves that there is a strong demand for locally accessible and locally supported university study, but trust in the model Uni Hub is delivering for the community.

CASE STUDY: Jess Axon, 23, was one of the first students to study through the Uni Hub's university centre at Port Pirie.

Jess studied early childhood education and, following a successful placement at Airdale Primary School, was offered a full-time role. She has been teaching since mid-2022, even before she graduated from the four-year Bachelor degree, and recently received a permanent teaching role.

"The Uni Hub opening was perfect timing for me," Jess said.

"I didn't want to leave home to study. I'm a country girl and I didn't want to live in the city.

"The Uni Hub has a welcoming environment for both school leavers and for older people who want to study and stay in the area."

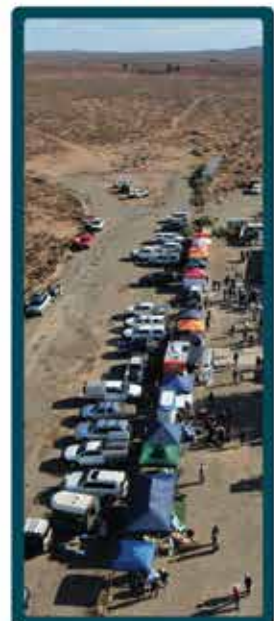

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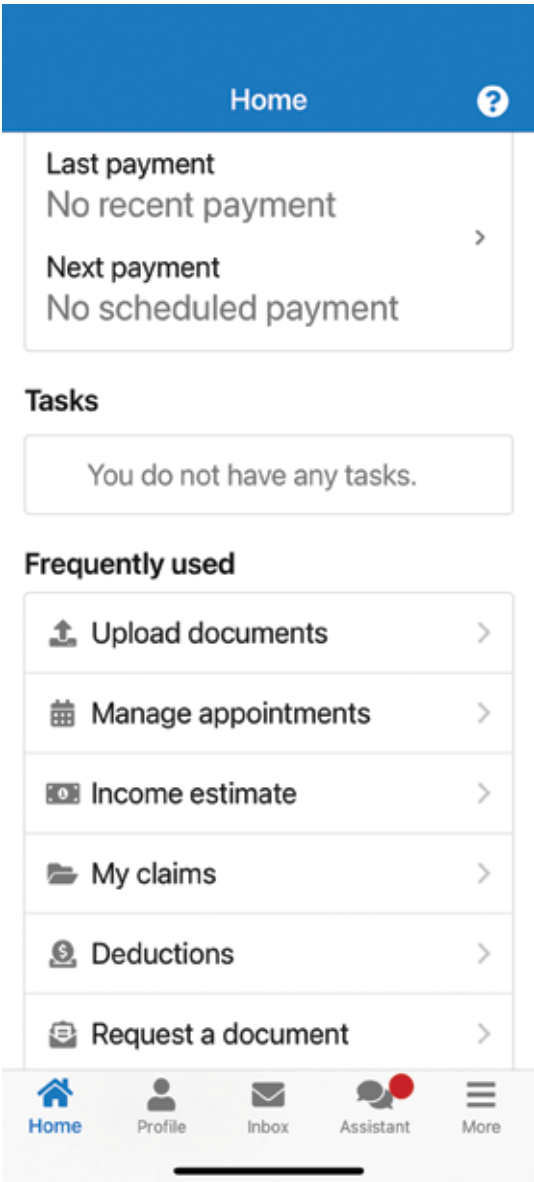
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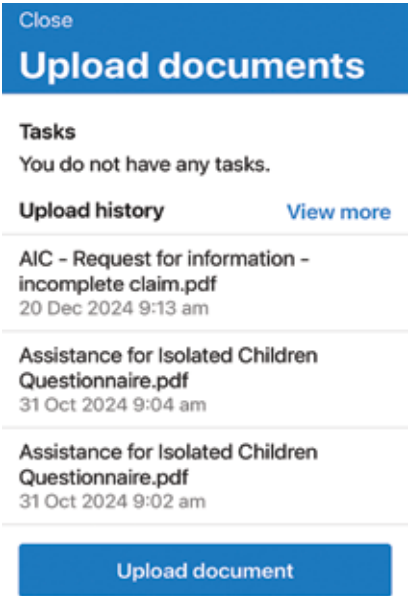

Delegation 2024

On Monday the 2nd of December 2024, Belinda Hatcher, Katrina Morris and Ian Morris attended 3 meetings in Adelaide as part of this year's delegation. There were a short, sweet group of meetings, but ones that will benefit SA ICPA with their advocacy for 2025.

We met with Blair Boyer MP – Minister for Education, Training and Skills, Clare Scrivens MLC – Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development and Luke Fraser – Executive Director of Strategic Policy and External Relations, Department for Education.

We had the opportunity to discuss the motions raised by members at the 2024 State Conference as well as other issues that have been raised by members throughout the year. Things that were spoken about included:

- Rapidly increasing boarding school fees and the need for an increase to the State Education Allowance to support families navigating this.

- The new technical college being built in Port Augusta and how it will be able to support rural and remote students in years 10, 11 and 12, especially those who are looking towards a more practical style of learning as well as the possibility of including an agricultural line of learning in the educational opportunities that will be provided there.

- The government's commitment to improving teacher housing in country areas.

- How the creation of a Distance Education Supervisor allowance / subsidy would benefit distance ed families and how it could look and be administered.

- Incentives are needed for the attraction and retention of teachers and support staff at rural schools as well as bus driver shortages.

- How we are trying to make contact with airlines about creating a student fare subsidy / price cap for flights to and from school out of regional areas.

- Regional and remote roads and the impact that the 'downsizing' of road gangs and maintenance schedules can have on families

travelling to school and school events.

- The recent Drought Support package announced by the Department of Primary Industries and Regions.

- How the areas of advocacy in education and agriculture are of similar nature and how they often affect similar groups of people.

- The Country Education Strategy and how SA ICPA would love the opportunity to be able to contribute to the key focus areas in the future.

- The relocation of Port Augusta School of the Air to the new Royal Flying Doctor Service clinic space in 2026.

An immediate follow up from these meetings has been Minister Boyer's advisor providing a direct contact for REX Airlines in South Australia, as well as an invitation for members in the new year to meet with Minister Boyer and be his guest for dinner at Parliament House.

All of the meetings were well received, but the one with Minister Boyer was especially beneficial. It took place at a café in Port Adelaide and the casual nature of the setting provided an opportunity to be candid with Mr Boyer and relay the personal stories of members and the reasoning behind motions being put forward. We were able to speak freely with him and in return he encouraged us to continue to advocate the way we are and that even if some of our requests are not being actioned in the way that we would like that they are still being taken seriously and haven't fallen on deaf ears.

Ian and Katrina's daughter Bonnie was the 'mascot' for SA ICPA during our meetings and it was great to have Minister Boyer witness and take particular note of how she was sitting quietly while reading a huge novel during our meeting. This was such a positive reflection on how amazing our bush educated kids are and the very reason why we were meeting with him in the first place.

- Boarding questionnaire was sent out to families in November to help federal council collate information to present to ministers. Thanks to the SA families who filled it in and returned it.
- 14 motions presented and passed at Federal Conference in Sydney.
- ICPA Aust – update from delegation can be found on the ICPA Aust website.
- All SA boarding schools will be invited to the 2025 State & Federal Conference.
- If your thinking about sending your child to boarding school check out the individual school webpages that outline scholarships and bursaries that you can apply for.

Communication

- The federal Council Communications team is well equipped with Sally Brindal leading the portfolio.
- The Telstra 3g shut down is complete.
- Federal Council met with the Universal Services Branch (USB) of the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications while on delegations in Canberra. The following issues were raised, Reduced network coverage, Call dropouts, Fortuitous coverage, Next G Wireless Link (NGWL) transition, Remote school network coverage, Power requirements for new technologies and the Department announced that they are undertaking their own trials of new technologies including Starlink at 50 sites around Australia.
- For long-term connectivity, Telstra recommends fixed internet solutions, such as NBN or Starlink, to reduce reliance on mobile networks during outages.

Distance Education

Kirsty Williams

- A huge congratulations to Jill Greenfield who has joined Federal Council this year and is the new DE Portfolio leader.
- Lai Kuan Lim concluded her role as HOC at the end of 2024 after seeing through her whole tenure. A huge thank you must go to Lai Kuan for her dedication and commitment to the school over the past 5 years.
- Rachael Russel has been appointed the new School of the Air (SOTA) Head of Campus (HOC) on a 1-year contract. A number of SOTA teachers are returning this year along with a few new teachers giving SOTA a full-teaching staff commencing the 2025 school year which is fantastic for consistency.
- The new SOTA building with the RFDS is moving ahead and earth-works have started. Building completion is hoped for 2026. Negotiations around a shared play space are happening with the Port Augusta Council.
- Mid-year Reception in-take happened for the first time this year. AIC for these students was granted after some initial complications. This small win shows the importance of members speaking up and the strength of ICPA to overcome hurdles.
- 2024 marked the end of an era with the last cohort of Year 7's attending SOTA Port Augusta. From 2025 SOTA will be R-6 only which is likely to affect funding and teaching allocations into the future.
- A costing review is being completed by Federal Council for an increase in the AIC- Distance Education allowance. Federal Council have had discussions with the Department of Education (DoE) regarding:
 - DE schools meeting their obligations for learning and well-being for all students. It was discussed at length that all schools, including DE schools need to meet their obligations under the Disability Discrimination Act.
 - School Resource Standards (SRS) for our Geographically Isolated (GI) students, focusing on the location of the DE school and the location of the student.
 - In-Home Care to include a clause to provide the ability for the employment of a supervisor for school aged children in the DE classroom. If you are in this situation, please send a case study (your story) to Jill.Greenfield@icpafc.org.au as this will support our advocacy.

Early Childhood Education

Edwina Bowie

- Edwina Bowie is leading the Early Childhood Education and Julia Broad is again leading the Early Childhood Education Federal team.
- 14 motions were carried or deemed covered at conference covering the following issues: AIC for pre-compulsory, In Home Care, ECEC staff pay parity, Universal access to ECEC, Infrastructure and operational funding of rural and remote ECEC centres, Mobile early learning, Working Holiday Maker Visa program
- Teacher pay parity, the Assistance for Isolated Children (AIC) for preschool and challenges with In-Home Care are among the key top-

ics for federal council. These issues, highlight the critical gaps in Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) across regional and isolated areas and were discussed at recent delegation.

- Introduction of the AIC Distance Education Allowance to be extended to the year before school, was also discussed in depth with the Minister for ECEC's office. Aswell as ongoing issues with In-Home Care, particularly the challenges faced by families in remote areas.

- Discussions with the National Farmers Federation (NFF) helped align our advocacy efforts, and we greatly appreciate their support in advancing these critical ECEC issues.

- Office for Early Childhood Development Funding: South Australian residents studying Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority (ACECQA) eligible early childhood qualifications can now access financial support to offset costs related to their study. There are three Streams to the QualifySA in Early Childhood Program: teacher support, educator support and aboriginal pathways. Rural Schools and School Travel

- On a federal level Nikki Mahony is the Rural and Remote Schools leader and Jennifer Ruska the School Travel. Hollie attended a federal/state zoom meeting in December.

- It was great to see so many small schools across the country getting into the spirit and flooding social media with their #WearRREd day posts. Hoping this initiate grows and encourage even more classrooms to be RREd Ready for 2025.

- Australian Government announced an \$80m financing facility to support the continued operations of the Rex network and their intention to extend the Federal Government Regional Flight Booking Guarantee. These developments represent a big step forward for the regional network that connects rural and remote communities.

- \$100 Sport Vouchers Program: The Sports Voucher Program pro-

vides a discount of up to \$100 on sport, dance, music or learn to swim fees for children living in South Australia. Sports vouchers will double to two \$100 vouchers per child, per year this year. For further information visit: www.sportsvouchers.sa.gov.au.

Specific Education Needs

- Ali Allison is the new federal leader.
- 4 Specific Needs motions were presented and passed at the federal conference in Sydney.
- Wait time to see specialists including tele health and allied health is a huge problem across rural and remote Australia.

Tertiary

Katrina Morris

- Tim Fletcher is now leading the Tertiary Education federal team and Anna McCorkle is still driving the Training team.

- o During recent delegations in Canberra, ICPA Australia met with the Minister and Assistant Minister for Education, the Department of Education, Services Australia, and the Department of Social Services to discuss key motions surrounding the Tertiary Access Payment (TAP).

- The Minister confirmed that TAP, initially funded for four years (2021–2024), will now become a permanent program. ICPA Aust highlighted the under use of the funding and need to extend eligibility to students taking a gap year.

- Services Australia has committed to providing ICPA with an application “cheat sheet” to simplify the process.

- The issue of HECS fee reductions for education and allied health students who are required to complete compulsory placements in remote and geographically isolated areas was raised. Concerns were reiterated about the significant burden placed on regional and remote students who must travel long distances for practical sessions.

- Rural And Regional Enterprise Scholarships Program: The Rural and Regional Enterprise Scholarship Program improves access to and completion of tertiary education courses. The scholarships are open to students from regional and remote areas in Australia.

- The Commonwealth Teaching Scholarships Program: School leavers and career changers who enrol full-time in initial teacher education (ITE) programs commencing in the first semester/study period of 2025 may be eligible for up to \$40,000 from the Australian Government to support them in their studies. The Commonwealth Teaching Scholarships Program aims to attract more high-achieving and diverse candidates into teaching by supporting new undergraduate and postgraduate ITE students to meet the costs of their study in exchange for teaching in government schools or government-run early learning settings for a time equivalent to the length of their ITE program. Up to 1,000 scholarships per year will be offered over five years between 2024 – 2028.
