

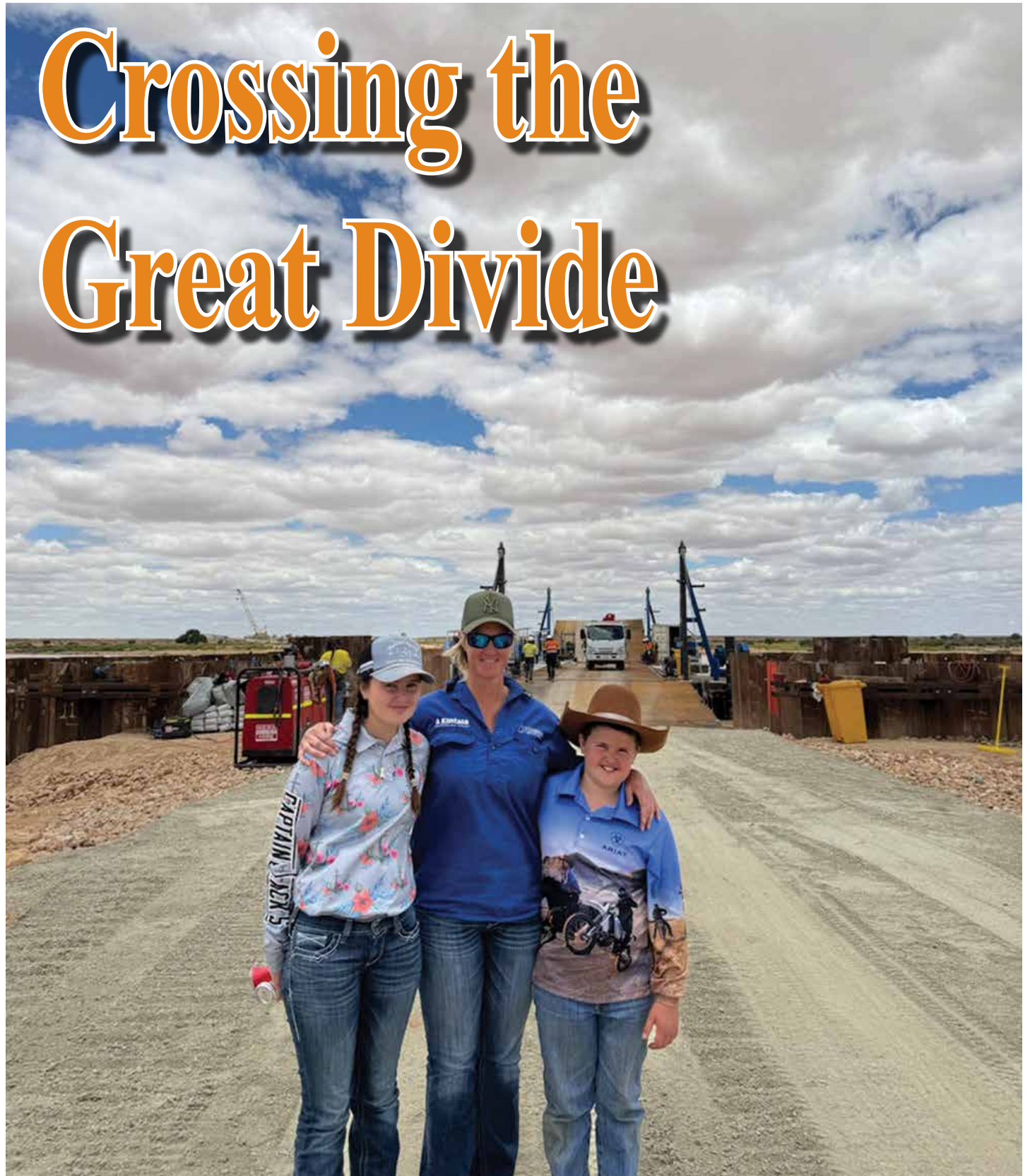

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54th Annual ICPA Federal Conference Wrap-Up

The 54th Annual ICPA Federal Conference was proudly hosted by the South Australian State Council Convening Committee at EOS SkyCity, Adelaide on 30–31 July. With delegates from across the country in attendance, this year's theme, "Education for the Heart and the Mind", set a thoughtful and inspiring tone for two full days of advocacy, connection, and celebration.

Registrations opened Tuesday afternoon, flowing nicely into a relaxed and enjoyable pre-conference drinks and nibbles event held at the SOL Rooftop Bar at EOS SkyCity. Thank you to Beach Energy and the Australian Boarding Schools Association (ABSA) for their generous support towards the night. It was a fantastic opportunity for delegates to meet new members, reconnect with others, and set the tone for a collaborative conference.

The conference opened with a past School of the Air (SOTA) governess Josie Rains singing the National Anthem beautifully followed by a heartfelt and humorous address by South Australian Federal Life Member Jane Gloster, who shared stories from her journey with ICPA, highlighting the joy and impact of her long-standing involvement. Jane's speech set the stage for a meaningful and energising event.

Federal President Louise Martin warmly welcomed attendees and launched the conference by opening the Distance Education portfolio, followed by lively discussions and motions across key areas such as Curriculum, Communications, School Travel, Early Childhood Education, Boarding, Specific Education Needs, Training and Tertiary. Each portfolio session featured thoughtful motions, reflecting the diverse challenges and solutions brought forward by ICPA branches nationwide.

Attendance was strong across both days, with Day 1 being the most attended, drawing 188 participants and representation from over 40 branches across Australia. The atmosphere was one of unity and purpose, as delegates collaborated to improve education outcomes for isolated families.

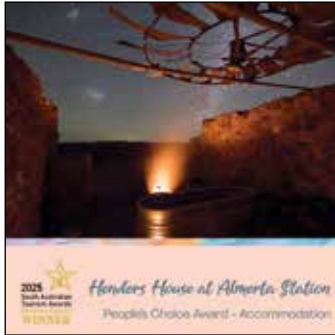

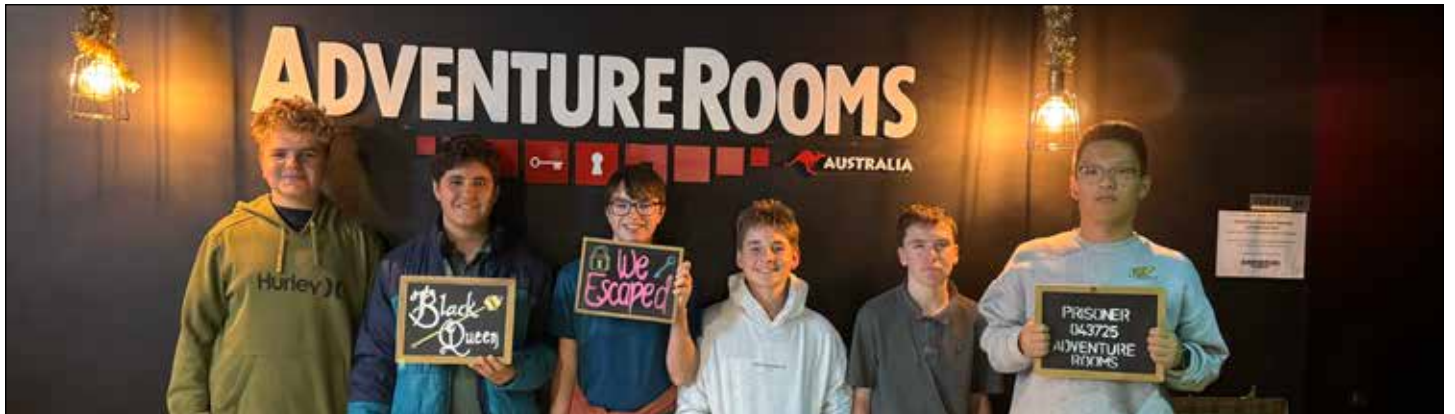

Our family finished the preschool chapter via distance education for the final time this week. No more little voices singing nursery rhymes in the background of SOTA lessons. No more tiny chairs pulled up to the school table.

This year saw our second round of preschool. It started quietly and nervously but soon became loud and fun. It brought paint on sleeves. Endless drawings and craft. Songs stuck in our heads and brought routines we did not know we needed until they were part of every week. For remote families, preschool is not just early learning. It is connection. It is structure. It is small people learning how to listen, wait, speak up, and join in. All the things that matter later.

We have lived this season two different ways. Once with a parent juggling lesson, a baby and station life and also with a governess guiding the schoolroom each day. Different setups. Same goal. Helping a small child grow ready for learning.

RICE sat at the heart of both journeys. They met our children where they were. They built confidence slowly and steadily. They turned

wiggly preschoolers into children who could sit, listen, try, and keep trying. They did it with patience and good humour. And with an endless supply of activities that somehow involved paint, movement, and learning at the same time.

They supported the adults too. On the days when nothing stuck. On the days when everyone was tired. On the days when progress felt invisible. They reminded us that learning does not rush. It grows.

It feels proud. It feels strange. It feels like another season closing before we quite feel ready for it to go but School of the Air waits with bigger lessons and bigger expectations.

To the RICE team, thank you. Thank you for the patience. Thank you for the structure. Thank you for the laughter. Thank you for giving our children such a strong and joyful beginning.

And to the families still in the thick of it, with paint on hands and songs on repeat, it matters more than you know.

Uni Hub Spencer Gulf has had an exceptionally busy year, highlighted by two Early Childhood Projects in Roxby Downs and Port Augusta. These initiatives have contributed to a growing educator workforce and supported the upskilling of existing staff. While this alone won't solve the childcare crisis, it is an important step toward building a sustainable early childhood education workforce for our regions.

Meanwhile, the Bachelor of Allied Health, delivered face-to-face in Port Pirie by Flinders University, continues to be a popular choice for school leavers who aspire to careers in Physiotherapy, Speech Therapy, or Occupational Therapy—without having to leave their hometowns.

Across our five Uni Hub Spencer Gulf locations, students have access to a wide range of pathway options, supported through face-to-face, online, and phone-based support from enquiry through to graduation.

We closed the year in Canberra at the National Regional University Study Hub Widening participation forum, which brought together representatives from across the RUSH (Regional University Study Hub) network, to examine access and equity issues for regional, rural, and remote students. Opportunities like this allow us to shine a light on the challenges facing remote South Australian communities and to work collaboratively across the network to inform policy directions and advocate for equity in education access.

I look forward to being part of the ICPA network and strengthening connections to education options across our regions.

SA ICPA Lone Member Boarding Schools

PRINCE ALFRED COLLEGE

Edward Hunt Boarding Scholarship - The Edward Hunt Boarding Scholarships commemorate the life of Edward Hunt (1878-1951) and have been made possible through the estate of his daughter, Mrs Torrie Chapman (1921-2016). The scholarships support students who are considering pursuing a career in agriculture, primary industry or a related field.

Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarship - The Scholarship has been made possible through the generosity of Mr. Ken Lord (PAC 1940-44) and his family and supports boys from remote areas for whom distance is a factor in their education. Preference will be given to applicants from remote regions of South Australia and from the Tibooburra, Wentworth, Broken Hill and other western New South Wales regions, Alice Springs and regional Northern Territory, Birdsville and South-west Queensland.

After many years of attending the ICPA state conference, I was absolutely honoured to attend my first Federal Confer-

ence in Adelaide. Being able to listen to and connect with families from all over Australia and hear their stories was amazing as always. The resilience, advocacy and support of every committee and region across our big, beautiful country and the challenges we all face, was something that has inspired me to continue to support and fight for opportunities for all families in our care.

As the Director of Boarding at Prince Alfred College in Adelaide, I am truly blessed to have students from the remote and isolated parts of Australia, who started their educational journey with SOTA and now get an opportunity to finish their schooling with other country and rural kids. These families add unique value and character to our boarding and schooling community. I love it when a local Adelaide or international student travels home with our SOTA boys to visit their remote places and properties. It allows their story to be heard and for other kids to get an insight into the hard work and sacrifice these families make for their children.

Our school will continue to celebrate and support as many ICPA families as we can and continue to support the Federal ICPA as they advocate for fair and equal educational opportunities and health services for their kids and families. I want to acknowledge and congratulate the SA committee for putting on an outstanding Federal conference, connecting people and advocating for every child, regardless of geographical location, to deserve equitable access to opportunity.

Rural and Remote Boarding Scholarship

- The Walford boarding community has a long history of supporting girls from rural and remote Australia, providing a home away from home while they immerse themselves in all the outstanding academic and co-curricular opportunities the School has to offer. In response to the challenges faced by families residing in isolated locations, we would like to provide fee relief to the family of an exceptional student who may otherwise be unable to attend Walford. This scholarship is available for new boarding students entering Years 7 to 12, providing remittance of 60% of tuition fees per year.

A Boarding Scholarship provides remission of up to 50% of tuition fees for the remaining duration of the student's schooling. New students entering Years 7 to 12 are eligible to apply.

It has been a pleasure connecting with the ICPA in 2025. As a boarding school, Walford is eager to do what we can to support our regional families. This year, after reviewing the ICPA's State Conference motions, we introduced a Rural and Remote Scholarship to help alleviate the cost barrier of a boarding education for country girls. Our current boarding students are also passionate about support-

ing the education of children living remotely. As part of their Boarding Week celebrations, the Walford Boarding students decided to raise funds for the Country Education Foundation. Through their efforts, more than \$2,500 was donated to support rural and regional youth. Finally, it was a privilege to sponsor and attend the ICPA Federal Conference, and learn more about the challenges facing isolated families, and what we as a boarding school can do to support them. We wish everyone a safe and enjoyable holiday break, and look forward to being involved with the ICPA again in 2026.

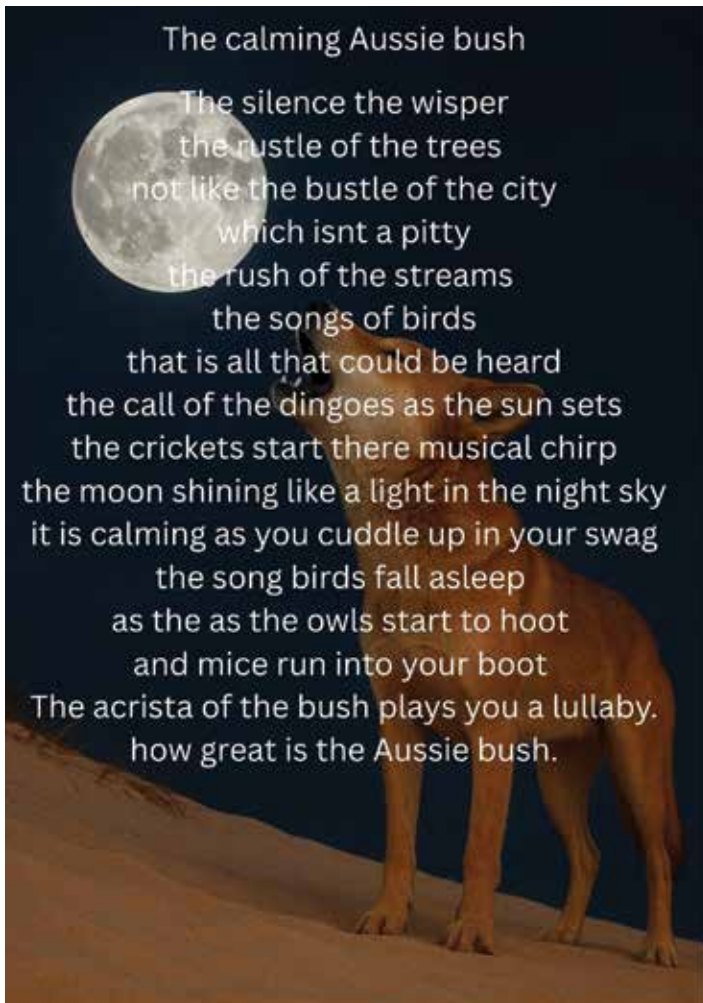

Marree Air Branch News

The Marree Air branch was thrilled to see our members attend the Federal conference in Adelaide this year. For some it was their first federal conference and the branch was active throughout the conference with a few motions, talking to motions and bringing up some of the urgent issues facing our families as a result of the cooper flooding. The cooper creek flooding has seen two of our families cut off for months and having to use a boat to get to educational and medical services. This relatively small group of people being hugely affected highlights the importance of ICPA's role in advocating for all families to have equal access to education. Without organisations like ICPA these issues would struggle to find their voice. We would like to thank the ICPA and our community for working together with all relevant stakeholders to get the barge across the cooper allowing access for our families.

We have had a busy year with families dealing with dry conditions on most of the stations and all that comes with that pressure. We would like to congratulate all our graduating children and we have a few kids going away to School next year. 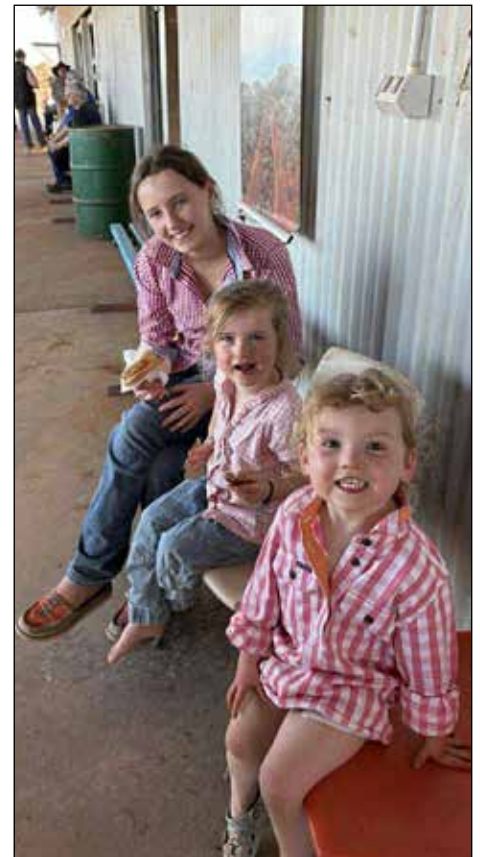

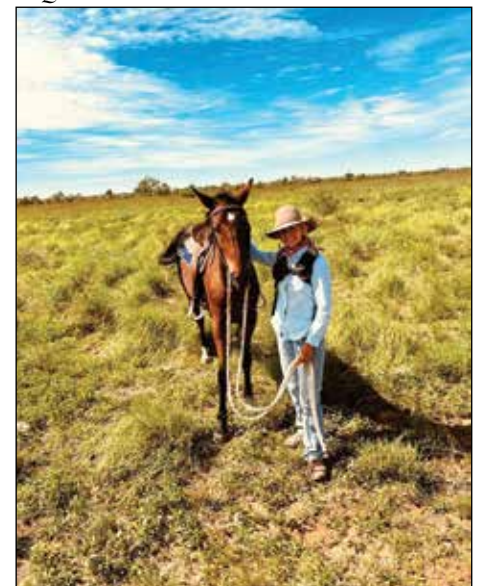

The Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS)

The Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS) is a government-funded subsidy program that supports South Australians who need to travel long distances for essential medical specialist care. Administered by the Rural Support Service within SA Health and delivered through the six regional local health networks, PATS provides financial assistance for travel and, in some cases, accommodation for eligible patients.

To be eligible for PATS subsidies, you need to:

- be a permanent South Australian resident
- be enrolled in Medicare and receive treatment claimable through Medicare
- be travelling more than 100km from your residence to your appointment or treatment location, not locally available
- have an appointment with, or receive treatment from the nearest recognised medical specialist or approved medical specialist service (unless there is a valid medical reason for bypassing this service, in which case your referring doctor must complete Part B of the application form)
- have claimed any available benefits from a private health fund first (if applicable), and not receive, or be eligible for, financial assistance for travel and accommodation through another provider
- Claims must be submitted within 6 months of appointment date with receipts for fuel/accommodation

A couple of factors for families to consider when navigating the system;

- If the specialist you see is not the closest visiting provider, speak with them to determine whether they can contact PATS to outline the medical reasons for continuing your care with them.
 - If you require multiple appointments to the same specialist (i.e. ongoing treatments), you can submit several claims on the one form, reducing the need for an individual application each time. Download Form 2 – Block Treatments

Crossing the Great Divide

March 2025 saw record-breaking rain in Western Queensland. That rain inundated the Cooper Creek Catchment area in record time. Those flood waters then make their way down through south western QLD, across the border into South Australia and terminate in Lake Eyre. The Cooper Creek cuts off towns like Innamincka as well as the stations between Birdsville and the Cooper Creek crossing on the Birdsville Track. The rains also ran the Diamantina and Georgina Rivers, both of which terminate in Lake Eyre. These rivers bring life and an abundance of vegetation perfect for grazing cattle on. The stations in this remote part of SA were stocked with agistment cattle from properties to the south in drought ravaged areas as well as with their own stock. It was a god send for those properties. However, when these three rivers flow together, it essentially creates an inland island. And 8 million plus acre island mind you, but never the less, an island. The people who reside in

this remote north east corner of SA were cut off on all sides by water. Not able to get supplies in, people in or out, fuel in or cattle out by road.

As you can imagine, this leads to all sorts of feelings and issues

for those people. What if there was a medical emergency and planes couldn't get in? What if you need to get to your local town or city for schooling?

They couldn't by road.

The SA state government, with

help from the Federal government, secured funding to build a barge large enough to carry road trains across the Cooper Creek. Even though it took three long months (in which time families travelled across the creek in a 3m tinnie, ferrying supplies and people back and forth), the barge was completed at the end of October 2025. It was a mammoth undertaking and we are grateful for the team at Maritime Construction for working so hard to get this project completed as quickly as possible. A few hiccups and learnings from the online booking requirements, but otherwise has moved quite smoothly!

It really is a sight to behold and does not disappoint!

It has allowed those families to the north to access medical care, get supplies in, get fuel in and of course attend end of year activities for school and pick up those children away at boarding school in Adelaide! As well it has allowed for the movement of thousands of head of cattle into southern South Australia.

State Council & Portfolio Reports

Boarding/Hostels/Second Home

Rural and remote families in South Australia continue to face significant challenges with boarding schools:

- High and rising costs that place considerable strain on family budgets,

- Emotional and social impacts on both students and their families.

A further ongoing issue is the inconsistency in boarding intake ages across Adelaide schools. Several schools only accept boarders from Year 9, despite secondary school beginning in Year 7. This gap forces many rural families into schooling arrangements that are not their first choice simply because those schools will accept younger boarders. Compounding this, the schools that do take Year 7 boarders are often the more cost-prohibitive options, placing even greater financial pressure on families who already have limited alternatives. While challenging, it remains worthwhile for families to contact schools directly, as some may offer flexibility or case-by-case considerations.

Boarding student numbers within SA ICPA appear to be increasing. Boarders Week, a national week to raise awareness and recognition for boarders and their families, was reported a success and that their children enjoyed a special week of activities and recognition.

Key focus areas this year for State Council have centred on several important issues affecting boarding families that were raised at the state conference. A major priority has been advocating for an increase to the State Education Allowance (SEA) and addressing the lack of targeted financial support through a designated bursary at boarding schools. With rural and remote families having no alternative to boarding school, adequate financial assistance is essential. Another key focus has been the introduction of a student subsidy for regional air travel to help reduce the financial burden of exeat and term break travel.

The ICPA bursary initiative has generated positive outcomes: Walford has developed a remote scholarship, Westminster continues its "Come for 6, Pay for 5" initiative, Pembroke has refined its scholarship criteria following consultation, and Sacred Heart will be discussing the ICPA bursary at its next College Executive Meeting. We thank these schools for working with us and hope that we can create a relationship with all the boarding schools in South Australia.

Additionally, two formal proposals from SA ICPA, one for an increase to the SEA Allowance and one for a Student Airfare Subsidy for boarding students, modelled on Queensland's Living Away From Home Allowance (LAFHA) scheme have been submitted [GU1.1] to the Education Minister. A response was received in relation to the SEA proposal, that the allowance is under review and remains subject to ongoing discussions and further consideration.

The Australian Boarding Schools Association (ABSA) highlighted that 75% of boarding students across Australia receive some form of financial assistance. ABSA has also offered to share resources with SA ICPA for use in Pipeline and on social media, so members are encouraged to keep an eye out for this material.

At the federal level, Amber Driver continues in her role as Federal Lead, with Kym Ross also serving on the portfolio team. At the Federal Conference in Adelaide, eight agenda motions and three supplementary motions were presented. SA ICPA put forward three motions:

- Re-establishing the Commonwealth Regional Scholarship Pro-

gram (CRSP)

- Advocating for an increase to the Basic Boarding Allowance

- Requesting a review of the eligibility criteria for the Additional Boarding Allowance.

Notably, ten of Adelaide's twelve boarding schools, along with St Mark's College in Port Pirie, sponsored the Federal conference. Eight schools attended in person, with several hosting trade tables or contributing goods to conference packs. This demonstrates the importance they put on ICPA, a tribute to the work people on ICPA have put in to develop and maintain strong relationships over many years.

Looking ahead, SA ICPA will continue to advocate for practical solutions that support rural and remote families, ensuring that financial assistance, travel subsidies, and targeted bursaries meet the real costs of boarding school.

With ongoing collaboration at both state and federal levels, and the continued support of schools and organisations such as ABSA, the aim is to make boarding more accessible and sustainable for all families who rely on it as their children's second home. By addressing these key issues, SA ICPA seeks to ease the financial and emotional burden on families while ensuring students have every opportunity to thrive academically and socially.

Communication

Louise Kohler, Pamela Cuffe and Dani Chapman

The Communications Portfolio has remained relatively quiet over recent months, though several important developments were discussed at this year's Federal Conference. A key theme throughout the conference was the ongoing decline and lack of reliable mobile and internet services across rural and remote Australia, which continues to place significant pressure on schools, families and students who rely heavily on online learning.

Telstra outlined two major partnerships with Starlink aimed at improving connectivity for remote users. The first will enable satellite-to-mobile texting for existing Telstra customers, allowing messages to be sent and received from compatible, unmodified phones outside of mobile coverage. While currently limited to text services, this technology has the potential to evolve into voice, data and IoT applications in the future. The second partnership will deliver a business enterprise-grade Starlink internet service for homes and businesses requiring fixed broadband in remote regions. Access to this service requires the purchase of a Starlink kit, offering a practical solution for those seeking reliable high-speed internet where traditional services are unavailable or inadequate.

At the end of October, Louise and Pamela met with Elise Petty from NBN via Zoom for a constructive update on upcoming product changes. NBN has partnered with Amazon to launch a new Low Earth Orbit (LEO) satellite that will orbit closer to Earth, significantly improving national coverage. NBN is currently awaiting Amazon's launch timeline, with the expected rollout planned for late 2026, dependent on successful migration and testing. This new LEO service will replace existing connections such as Sky Muster and, importantly, will be Australian owned and operated, ensuring all data remains subject to Australian regulatory protections. Elise also encouraged anyone experiencing ongoing NBN issues to contact her as an escalation point once all standard support avenues

have been exhausted.

Across South Australia, there continues to be little to report as most families have now transitioned to Starlink, resulting in fewer connectivity issues.

Distance Education

ICPA Federal Conference in 2025 saw 11 Distance Education motions put forward, 9 carried and 2 lost. Whilst the ones that were debated and lost did not have achieved their desired outcome, it's still important to note the issues and branches' intent for what they are lobbying for. The motions that focused mainly on allowances and the need for a Distance Education Teaching Allowance can make you feel like you are flogging a dead horse,[GU2.1] but repetition keeps it at the forefront of the minds we are trying to change and being the squeaky wheel never hurt!

At our School of the Air (SOTA) campus, the end of term 2 saw the Head of Campus (HOC) Rachel Russel resign for another position, more aligned with her passion in policy writing. Again, staff retention is a constant issue at our Port Augusta site, but we are lucky to have some staff who have stuck around longer than most. We were very fortunate to have a new HOC starting in week 9 of term 3, Paul Pitkin. Paul is local to the area so comes with prior knowledge, experience and skills. It's been many a year since a male held this role so this will add to our male/female ratio, with our 2 current male staff happy to have some 'bro' time. 2026 will see the continuation of most of our teaching staff, which is a welcome relief to our students who need consistency and familiarity during their early schooling years. It's also a great opportunity for the teachers to get to know the students and their needs as they see them grow.

We welcomed a new School Services Officer (SSO) to SOTA to help support our students in their learning but unfortunately this position was based out of Marden, Adelaide, making it hard to connect and unable to meet the students in person. The beginning of 2026 will see a Port Augusta based SSO take on this role. Traditionally this role had been Port Augusta based, to best provide direct support to staff and students, but the right person isn't always in reach and we appreciate Julie Taylor's efforts in making sure positions are filled when a dedicated panel was also trying to fill the HOC position. We welcome having the SSO back in Port Augusta as it will be more beneficial for the children and teachers.

2025 will be Julie Taylor's last year as Open Access College's principal, after almost 20 years in that very hectic and demanding role. Julie has been passionate, dedicated, and a strong leader, seeing many changes at the SOTA campus and always finding solutions when we found ourselves in precarious situations! She leaves huge shoes to fill but is very deserving of retirement and everyone in the SOTA community wishes her well in her travels.

Early Childhood Education

A planning meeting was held on 7 November between SA ICPA, Remote and Isolated Childrens Exercise (RICE) and the Office for Early Childhood Development (OECD) to progress the introduction

of three-year-old preschool for remote and isolated families through RICE. Building on earlier discussions, the meeting moved into the practicalities of program design, delivery options and service integration. Several models for both three- and four-year-old preschool were explored, including closer collaboration with School of the Air and the possibility of using existing government preschool sites such as Port Augusta to support quarterly face-to-face components. Considerable discussion focused on what a practical and supportive three-year-old model could look like. Elements canvassed included an initial orientation, short online sessions three times a week, a parent orientation, educator home visits each term, opportunities for additional individual learning support and access to essential technology for families. A strong emphasis was also placed on parent support, including wellbeing check-ins, parenting advice, early learning education and improved connections to child development and allied-health services. RICE also highlighted elements from the current four-year-old program they would like to replicate, such as reimbursement for family travel and accommodation, and an educator travelling with the teacher on visits. RICE will now prepare a formal proposal for the OECD detailing the preferred model, projected enrolments, timelines and any additional costs.

The meeting also addressed service-integration needs. SA ICPA and RICE shared positive past experiences with child-development checks, and Child and Family Health Services (CAFHS) indicated a willingness to strengthen its support for remote families. OECD will further explore whether a maternal and child-health nurse could travel alongside RICE teams to ensure more consistent face-to-face care.

Discussions then turned to the suggestion that RICE revisit the possibility of transitioning Outback Child Care to the In-Home Care model. To better understand the cost viability, a formal quote was sought on 10 November using real household income data. The modelling showed weekly family gap fees of around \$1,000–\$1,300 for one child, even after the child care subsidy (CCS) was applied, with additional requirements for live-in board, holding fees and penalty-rate hours. Under current settings, IHC remains financially unviable for most remote families without significant additional government support.

Looking ahead to 2026, RICE preschool enrolments appear strong, with five children confirmed for Semester 1 and six for Semester 2, with more likely to join as the year progresses. These numbers reinforce the need for accessible, fit-for-purpose preschool delivery across remote SA.

SA ICPA continues to be engaged with the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Youth (ARACY) to inform national early-childhood policy, with further discussions scheduled next year. The Minister for Education, Blair Boyer, has confirmed there is currently no funding available to extend the Early Years Allowance to pre-compulsory kindergarten, and further engagement is recommended with Nicole Lynch, Executive Director of Policy, Planning and Provision.

At the November Minister Early Childhood Advisory Forum (MECAF), discussion focused on the Preschool Outreach initiative, which aims to reduce participation barriers related to transport, food insecurity and access to essential items. In 2026, each Preschool Plus enrolment will attract \$1,700 in outreach funding, with the possibility of further expansion in 2027. While outreach currently targets lower social economic areas (SEIFA 1 and 2), SA ICPA continues to highlight the equity gap for remote families, who often face greater barriers despite not being captured within standard so-

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cio-economic measures (SEIFA). MECAF identified its priorities for 2026 as

- Workforce
- Aboriginal co-design
- The rollout of three-year-old preschool

The QualifySA program continues to support the early-childhood workforce, offering substantial scholarships for approved qualifications, with additional support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and for those living in regional and remote areas. Funding is paid across study milestones and early employment, and applications remain open year-round.

At the federal level, ICPA continues its involvement in early-education reform efforts, including work across Thrive by Five and the Department's Safety and Quality Framework. Announcements at the Early Childhood Australia National Conference included the reaffirmation of universal access, a national child-safety investment package, a 15% educator pay rise, additional CCS savings, the 3-Day Guarantee and ongoing expansion through BEEF and the Community Child Care Fund.

Rural Schools and School Travel

This year's Federal Conference saw strong representation across the Rural Schools and Travel Portfolio, with ten motions presented. Two of these motions focused on the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate, while seven highlighted the ongoing need for more affordable airline travel for rural and remote families. A further motion called for the introduction of incentives to encourage experienced teachers to relocate to rural and remote schools, where staffing shortages continue to be a significant concern. This year's conference once again demonstrated the importance of strong advocacy and collaboration to ensure rural and remote students receive the support and opportunities they deserve.

The Federal Portfolios are well supported, with the School Travel Portfolio led by Tim Fletcher and supported by Melissa Kerr, Amber Driver and Jill Greenfield. The Rural and Remote Schools Portfolio is led by Nikki Mahony alongside Anna McCorkle and Anne Chater.

In July, the SA ICPA State Council met with several key stakeholders during our annual delegation meetings. One of the matters raised was the ongoing issue of bus driver accreditation. It was noted that Uni Hub does not currently offer this accreditation, and Council agreed that further exploration with Access Training Centre (ATC) and Construction Industry Training Centre (CITC) [GU3.1] is required. Additional research will also be needed to identify suitable course providers capable of supporting the needs of rural communities.

State Council also met with the Hon. Geoff Brock to discuss the motions put forward. Concerns were raised around travel grants and allowances, which were acknowledged as outdated and no longer adequate to meet the real costs faced by rural families. Delegates highlighted that travel associated financial barriers are preventing children from attending school camps and important early learning assessments. The issue of kindy-aged children using school buses was also discussed, emphasising the need for transport policies that reflect the realities faced by remote families and ensure equitable access to early education.

Further meetings were held with the Australian Boarding Schools Association, who provided valuable insights into initiatives operating in other states. Queensland's Bush to Boarding Scheme, developed in partnership with REX Airlines, was presented as a strong model for reducing airfare costs for rural families. New South Wales was also highlighted for its portal system that provides school children with free travel on public buses and trains. ABSTUDY was also noted, which provides Indigenous students with free travel, and it was agreed that similar support would be of great benefit to rural and remote children.

Discussions with the Hon. Blair Boyer focused on key issues affecting rural and remote students. Delegates raised concerns about the significant barriers faced by preschool-aged children who are not counted in bus route planning and may only travel if a seat happens to be available. This uncertainty results in many families driving long distances or withdrawing their children from preschool altogether. A policy change was advocated to ensure preschoolers in remote areas have reliable and consistent bus access. Delegates also discussed severe staffing shortages in rural and remote schools and the limitations of the current Country Incentive Zone Allowance, which applies only to teachers. Council proposed considering ways to extend support to SSOs and experienced local parents, helping to bolster workforce capacity in remote communities.

In November, State Portfolio leaders met via Zoom to share updates and discuss emerging national issues affecting rural school travel. At the federal level, progress has been limited, although there appears to be some interest within government departments in extending PACER loadings or formalising the currently increased rates, which have helped boost regional participation. The Commonwealth continues to focus on teaching scholarships and paid practical placements as its primary strategy for improving teacher attraction and retention.

Cross-state discussions highlighted several common challenges. Declining enrolments are affecting the viability of services such as bus routes and staffing, and many states are finding it increasingly difficult to secure meetings with their transport departments to address these concerns. Participants also raised significant worries about the lack of rural proofing in policy development, noting that initiatives such as free kindy or swimming programs often function well in metropolitan settings but do not translate effectively into remote areas. The meeting also identified opportunities to share successful models between states, particularly around bus systems and bypass arrangements, to help strengthen outcomes for rural and remote students nationwide.

Specific Education Needs

Hollie Williams

Addressing specific education needs in rural and remote South Australia continues to be challenging and requires a tailored approach. It requires increased investment to ensure students in geographically isolated areas receive equitable support.

On the federal front, Prue Vaschina has taken on the role of leading the Specific Needs Portfolio, supported by Jen Ruska. At the Federal Conference, five Specific Needs agenda motions and one supplementary motion were presented—and all six were success-

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fully carried.

A proposal was submitted to the PATS (Patient Assisted Travel Scheme) Director seeking a change to eligibility criteria under PATS, aiming to improve access to specialist appointments for remote families. Many families have been unable to claim PATS due to being deemed ineligible when bypassing the closest visiting specialist location to group multiple appointments in a more practical centre, often Adelaide. As a result, students from rural and remote areas are missing numerous school days to attend short, mid-week appointments instead of being able to cluster these appointments during school holidays.

During delegation discussions with the RFDS, significant concerns were raised about delayed or inconsistent access to allied health services such as speech therapy, occupational therapy, and dietetics in remote communities. While urban families receive timely bedside support, regional families often do not. Referral pathways for OT and speech services can take weeks to months, and many providers offer only virtual support with minimal in-person outreach. Accessing services such as the NDIS can also depend heavily on local staff advocacy and, at times, sheer luck, rather than a reliable and consistent system.

Further meetings with Blair Boyer, Minister for Education, Training and Skills, and the SA Department for Education highlighted ongoing gaps in developmental support for remote families. The reduction of CaFHS nurses and paediatric services has contributed to delays in identifying speech and developmental issues, limited early intervention opportunities, and increased risk that parents may not recognise developmental concerns due to isolation and limited peer comparison. Speech delays were emphasised as a critical issue, with early checks becoming increasingly difficult to access.

The discussions held with government, health, and education stakeholders reinforce the need for practical solutions that recognise the unique challenges faced by isolated families. ICPA will continue working closely with all sectors to push for improved access, early intervention, and meaningful policy change to support every child, no matter where they live.

The Specific Needs Portfolio remains essential as families in rural and remote South Australia continue to face significant barriers in accessing developmental, health, and educational support. The issues discussed with PATS, RFDS, and the Department for Education highlight just how crucial it is that services are flexible, accessible, and responsive to the unique needs of isolated students. Moving forward, the Specific Needs Portfolio will continue to advocate strongly for improved pathways, earlier intervention, and equitable service provision, ensuring that children living in remote regions are not disadvantaged simply because of where they call home.

Tertiary

There have been several important developments within the Tertiary Portfolio this year. The most significant is the introduction of the Commonwealth Prac Payment (CPP), which commenced in July. This payment supports students undertaking mandatory practical placements as part of a Bachelor's or Master's degree in teaching, nursing, midwifery or social work. Eligible students

now receive \$331.65 per week, benchmarked annually to the single Austudy rate as at 1 January. Students are encouraged to contact their higher education provider to apply and can also access eligibility information through the "For Students" page. Those completing a Diploma of Nursing through TAFE or another Registered Training Organisation can find relevant details on the Your Career website.

Families are also reminded that helpful information regarding boarding allowances and tertiary financial support is available on the ICPA Australia website. One such allowance, the Tertiary Access Payment (TAP), continues to play an important role in assisting regional, remote and very remote students as they transition into further education. TAP provides a total of \$5000, delivered in two instalments. To receive the second instalment, students must complete an online review process and provide an up-to-date Proof of Enrolment. This document must include the student's name, education provider, units enrolled or confirmation of full-time study, the study period, and a document issue date that falls after the relevant assessment period. Reviews can be submitted before the document is uploaded, however the required paperwork must be provided within 28 days to avoid payment delays. If documents are submitted within 90 days, students may request a re-assessment. This process ensures that students receive the support needed to continue their education while maintaining necessary accountability.

Training opportunities also continue to expand across regional South Australia. The Port Augusta Access Training Centre (ATC), located at 20257 Augusta Highway, offers industry-relevant training for students from Port Pirie, Whyalla, Roxby Downs and surrounding regions. Courses currently available include chainsaw maintenance, confined space training, various crane licences, dangerous goods handling, dogging, earthmoving, first aid, forklift training, height safety, load restraint, white card training, temporary traffic management, and several others. Training can be delivered at the Port Augusta site, at workplaces, or at alternative locations as required. For more information, families can contact the Regional Area Manager in Port Augusta on 08 8642 6146 or the Adelaide office on 08 8169 9800.

The new Port Augusta Technical College (PATC) has also officially opened, providing an exciting addition to the region's education and training options. PATC offers part-time industry-based training programs across four key sectors: civil, resources and infrastructure; cookery and tourism; health and social support; and multi-trades. These programs have been co-designed with leading employers to ensure students graduate with the skills and experience needed to thrive in their chosen fields. Training is delivered in week-long blocks by registered training organisations, industry trainers, teachers and employers, supported by a combination of VET qualifications, SACE subjects and employability skills. The college is open to students across the Upper Spencer Gulf, Eyre Peninsula, Mid North, Yorke Peninsula, Far North and the APY Lands. For those who cannot travel daily, supervised overnight accommodation is available onsite. Students attend PATC for their scheduled training blocks and then complete the remainder of their SACE subjects through their home school.
