two a page to print, and compare that to the technology we have

today, I feel very fortunate to be taking on the role in more modern times. Even though we have come a long way down the track, we continue to need to fight for similar things to the past, such as a telephone that works all of the time and a reasonable conveyance allowance. The conveyance allowance is currently set at 25.24 cents per kilometre, vastly different to the ATO rate of 78 cents per kilometre for business travel in a private vehicle. In 1998 the conveyance rate was 9 cents per kilometre and ICPA was requesting an increase to 20 cents per kilometre.

After holding the 2022 State Conference online, it was heart-warming to make the member connections once again in person and share stories of the past and present. Hearing guest speakers' personal regional and remote education stories showed a connection and understanding. For example, Ms Meredith Hammat MLA, appearing on behalf of Dr Tony Buti, Minister of Education, shared stories of her time at Broomehill Primary School and Kojonup District High School.

At this year's ICPA WA State Conference, we welcomed two new councillors, Arlene Sutherland and Jareth Forrester. I look forward to sharing their ICPA journeys.

NEW STATE COUNCILLORS




Jareth Forrester

It certainly must have seemed a long way down the track for the Midwest Branch, the convenors of the 50 year celebrations. After two years of planning, unplanning and then re-planning, finally ICPA WA was able to celebrate 50 years at the 51st Annual Conference, at the Pagoda Resort and Spa, Como. Ms Hammat considered it her good fortune to be sharing the 50th celebrations with ICPA WA and shared her education journey with conference. From her personal experience Ms Hammat is only too aware of the issues that rural and families face in accessing an equitable education.

Through Millennium Kids Inc students are taking the initiative to provide solutions to real world problems; critical thinking that is necessary for the future.

Telstra and NBN both spoke about advances in technology and future developments, ensuring the connectedness of families. Richard Stokes, CEO Australian Boarding Schools Association shared his story on the changes and progress he has seen in boarding over his 43 year involvement.

A few weeks ago I received an email from the then WA State President Sally Brindal, this email was sent out to all ICPA members, stating that as it stands, there weren't enough delegates coming to the state conference (being held at the Pagoda Resort and Spa Perth) for it to be constitutional and asking for members to please consider giving some of their time to come down to Perth and play a part in helping keep this vital association going. To be honest, I was more than a little surprised by the shortage of attendance, especially as it is a state conference with the addition of the ICPA WA's 50th year celebrations which were postponed last year due to Covid restrictions.

Now I could spend the space in this fantastic magazine, run by volunteers, talking about how vital the ICPA is to everyone facing challenges educating their children in isolation, but I feel that if you're reading the articles here, you probably already know that. And what actually popped into my head when I received the said email was the song by Paula Cole, *Where Have All the Cowboys Gone?* Except in my version, it was Where Have All the Volunteers Gone? My mind kept wandering down this line of thought as I started my 240 km journey to Port Hedland to catch the plane to Perth for the conference. I started looking inwards and outwards for the answer to this the question because I'm sad to say I'm one of

those people who have, until this point, not put my hand up to volunteer for ICPA in any form apart from voluntarily paying my membership and a fundraising bike ride I did many years ago with the help from my Mum and youngest bro.

It's both reassuring and concerning to find that lack of participation at a voluntary level for clubs, associations, groups etc, is down across all of Australia, so it's not just WA ICPA suffering. Alana Moller, Federal ICPA President, made this very point at the branches meeting prior to conference. Many branches across Australia are struggling to maintain membership and/or participation at both branch and state levels. As I began my Virgin flight to Perth in the middle seat, between two people who'd just come off night shift, I asked myself why I haven't volunteered my time? Well, the first word that popped into my head was burnout. I know I can speak for many people when saying burnout is a very slow burn. It can take several years to even acknowledge one has it (if they do at all) and sometimes another few years to actually do something about it. When you make your living off the land, burnout is sadly all too common and accepted. It doesn't create an environment where you want to put your hand up for extra

work at the cost of your business or that tiny window of time you may have for your family or for yourself. A friend said to me recently 'you must fill your own cup first before filling others.' It is a genuine concern of mine that I wouldn't be able to fill the extra cup and therefore let people down. Once again I realized I'm not alone in feeling this way.

As I walked into the Pagoda Resort and Spa on the banks of the beautiful Perth icon, the Swan River, I felt more than a little nervous walking into a room of people whom I mostly didn't know or hadn't seen in a very long time. I live in a remote part of the state and over the past few years, covid restrictions had pretty much squashed any face-toface meeting opportunities, it wouldn't be far off to say I'm possibly a little scratchy when it comes to the art of conversation.

Of course, my concerns were not warranted, it was a wonderful night catching up with old friends and

acquaintances and meeting new people.







As I headed upstairs to my lovely hotel room, I wondered how big of an impact covid has had on volunteer numbers. I think we'd all agree it's been huge. There is no doubt in my mind it has created a disconnect in the community due to both individual experiences and challenges and community challenges as a whole. The challenges have been and are still many and complicated and far too intricate to unpack here, but I know volunteer positions have and are suffering greatly due to covid.

After finding my seat on conference morning and meeting some of our golden senior members at my table, who made me feel so welcome and are still truly passionate about child education and equality after all these years, I settled in to listen to the motions being put forward by branches across the state and the key speakers. I came to realise just how powerful these motions can be in bringing about change. The ICPA is a very influential and respected association in the political realm, and the State Council is a force to be reckoned with when taking branch motions to the relevant political members and interested parties. I wanted to explore the value motions have on volunteer interest, after all, people typically volunteer their time for things that interest them, or they feel are relevant to them.

Since being at the conference I have spoken to several people about this, and they all sing the same song, they only want to invest precious time if the topics are relevant to them. Now I think to myself, how is that made possible? Of course, as far as ICPA is concerned, relevance starts at the branch level and putting forward relevant motions for that region, which in turn enhances interest. But how can that be achieved if some branches are struggling with active membership numbers? It's like one problem feeding off the other problem.

The conference started to draw to a close and new State Councillors and Executive Officers were elected, all volunteers willing to give their time to help improve education for our young people living in isolation. To my surprise, all the Executive Officers stayed on as State Councillors and several State Councillors put their hand up for Executive roles. What makes them continue to volunteer their time at a state level and how can we mirror that at a branch level? There is no doubt from my conversations that people want to feel interested, welcome, part of a team, have a sense of achievement, be supported, valued and not overloaded with work. It was a really enlightening conference for me, and I would highly recommend participation, even at an observer level, trust me and you won't be disappointed.

After finding someone to jump-start my car back in Hedland (yes I left my light on), I headed home and continued to ponder the volunteer problem. I would have to say the answer is at the root of the tree. For a tree to grow strong and stand the test of time it must have strong roots to feed off. Focusing on branch level participation and investing time and money into recruitment at this level is absolutely imperative in ensuring the longevity of the ICPA.



As a friend recently said to me, the branches are the ICPA. So, after chasing my own horses off the veranda for the second time whilst writing this I've come to the conclusion that the cowboys haven't gone, they just haven't mounted their steeds for a while. I'm absolutely confident those horses will be on the move again soon. As life gets back to normal after Covid and people have been able to rest and recalibrate their lives, they'll be back and the branches will be ready to welcome them with open arms and hearts. We care too much about our kid's education to let such a valuable association dwindle, as we all know our children will be the only losers if it does.

FROM PINGRUP TO PERTH

The 51st State Conference was memorable and moving for me personally, as it was my first conference in person and my second year with the ICPA Lakes District Branch. It just so happens that I was elected President for the Lakes District Branch in Southern WA at the very first meeting I attended in March 2022. I had attended due to wanting to see the new Pingrup Pantry Café, have a cuppa and learn more about ICPA, but alas, I walked out a President for a group I knew little about.

Fast forward a year, and it was wonderful to finally be able to put faces to names at the 2023 State Conference (as the 2022 conference was all online). I was surrounded by inspiring and hard-working people in their education roles, parenting roles and supporting industries. The panel discussion was a great banter between life members and station families and what ICPA means to them.

The past members' stories spaced out throughout the conference had me laughing and in tears. I found it difficult to understand that the plights for isolated education have, in some ways, remained unchanged and we still have to lobby for what seems to be common sense and logic when it comes to delivering quality education to regional families and support for educators.

Our Lakes District motions ranged in issues from children's access to school therapists, teachers unable to take leave, school bus seatbelts, autism program support, strategic education directions implementations in the region and boarding away from home allowance increase. When I asked my friend if we should wear our name tags to dinner that night, she replied, "I think they might know our names after listening to us all day!" We were able to understand other branches' issues in their motions put forward, in particular, the Kalgoorlie branch being charged excessively for the School of the Air Camp venue in Kalgoorlie since the government decided to outsource the management to all 6 school camps in WA. These camps

have been under pressure to be closed by the government due to lack of use, yet they are price beyond reason. Having been a School of the Air student I fully agree with the importance in having School of the Air camps and know how memorable these camps are to students.

I am Western Australian born, however I attended the Charters Towers School of the Air for years one and two via two way radio on a station 200 km from Charters Towers in Queensland. My mother needed a job after her marriage breakup in Western Australia. With all her family in Queensland she found herself on the other side of Australia single, unemployed and two kids under the age of 5. She knew she needed a job where she could care for us and save money. Having governessed in her younger years in Queensland and the Northern Territory she secured a position on a station in Central Queensland and drove the Datsun 240 km with the two children up the bulldust and corrugated roads to Bulliwallah station.





We had so much freedom on the station. I would rush to complete my school booklet at the start of the week, then we would head bush, swim in the creek, ride poddy calves, dig in the dirt under the homestead with puppies, catch pigeons or find piglets to drop in a bucket and wait for the mother sow to come and give chase. One morning Mum couldn't find me, because I had woken up in the dark and rounded up the milking cows and put them in the yards (it was a 640 acre paddock). School of the Air camps were highlights meeting up with other students from surrounding stations. The activities included coordinated dances and performances and putting faces to names. I've held strong memories from the station years, despite being so young.

After completing my primary and secondary education in Queensland, mostly in Roma, I moved back to Western Australia to attend university and live closer to my father, who was still farming. At university I met my husband and today we are farming 350 km south of Perth with 3 boys in Year 8, 5 and 2. It is my son's second year at high school in Year 8 attending a local district high school and my other children attend a local primary school in another town, so I am mostly a taxi service for 2023 and rely on the Western Australian school bus service.



These days I don't consider myself isolated geographically like growing up in Queensland. On the plus side, today's world is offering so much more scope for remote learning. I look forward to advances in connectivity for communications, more teaching incentives for regions, greater family

assistance from government for boarding families and keeping local regional education strong.














MY FAVOURITE MEMORY ABOUT MY TIME AT MSOTA

FLOODING AT MEDA





Meda Station, before and after the floods

At the start of this year, the Kimberley region copped one-in-one-hundredyear floodwaters, with homes and properties destroyed and estimated tens of thousands of livestock lost in total in the area.

Members of the Kimberley Air branch, Troy and Monica Haslet, manage Meda Station, located 40 kilometres out of Derby along the Gibb River road. Troy has been managing Meda for ten years.

They were away in New Zealand when the floods hit their property, so they had to organise a charter plane to get back, which luckily, was not too difficult to do.

Monica says two rivers run through their property, and water levels were the highest they had ever been.. The water had gotten that high before on Meda station, however, because of the rapid fall of rain in such a short span of time, it created worse flooding.

Monica says the rivers are tidal, so cattle were sadly washed out onto the marsh, with about 500 head lost. The floods also took several of their horses, including two of Troy and Monica's best horses and the kid's pony, which was especially upsetting.

Because not too much was damaged, Monica says the clean-up process won't be too rigorous, however, one hundred kilometres of fencing needs to be stood up, which is especially important because it is drawing closer to mustering season.

NBN ANNOUNCEMENT



NBN Co has announced that around 24,000 homes and businesses across regional Australia are now able to access nbn fixed wireless for the first time.

This marks a significant milestone in the upgrade of the nbn fixed wireless network, which is aimed at transforming the way people stay connected across Australia, regardless of where they live.

• Key to the program is an enabling an additional 120,000 homes and businesses in the satellite footprint to be able to access nbn fixed wireless, as well as introducing enhanced speeds during the busiest times of the day over the overall fixed wireless network and two new higher speed plans by the end of the program. The upgrade is being funded by a \$750 million investment, with \$480 million from the Australian Government and \$270 million from nbn.

The approximate 24,000 premises that can now access nbn fixed wireless services were previously located within

the nbn satellite footprint. The locations were chosen based on their proximity to existing nbn fixed wireless towers, with priority given to those in the most heavily used parts of the nbn satellite footprint.

The announcement builds on nbn's commitment to upgrades being delivered across regional Australia, such as the trial of a new nbn Sky Muster Plus plan, which aims to provide faster speeds and more unmetered data to satellite customers, and the additional one million more households and businesses, that will benefit from the fibre roll-out program that continues across the country, with up to 58% in regional areas.

Access to fast and reliable internet connectivity can help fast and reliable internet connectivity can help schools and universities improve access to education and enhance the learning experience for students in regional and rural areas.
