

Life Membership - A reflection on many years of service to ICPA

At the recent AGM of the Alice Springs Branch Liz was awarded Life Membership of the branch. A well deserved award, Liz reflects on her many years with ICPA

Thank you very much Alice Springs Branch for bestowing the honour of Alice Springs Branch Life Membership upon me - and what an honour it is! I hope to fill it to the best of my and your expectations. Sarah Cook (Branch Publicity Officer for 2018) has asked me to fill in some details about myself.

How long have you been a member of the Alice Springs branch: I became a member of the local branch in approx. 1995 when David, Jack and I moved back to Indiana Station after being at Annitowa Station. David's sister Rebecca was a member and received the PEDALS mag once a quarter and I was impressed with the information in the magazine, thinking, "if I have to send our little ones away to boarding school one day, it may be a good thing to keep in touch with these institutions". I had previously been a Govie on a couple of stations and certainly heard of ICPA and knew that back then they used the radio for their meetings but had no idea what impact this wonderful organisation would have on my life. So, I read the mags, for the next few years, but not really closely and life was simple...

Do you remember your first meeting? What was your first impression/experience like?

Jack was in enrolled in 1998 and at the end of the year, the Swim Week, there was a meeting for the ICPA group at the 'Red Centre Resort' - poolside. I did not know many people there and felt quite out of my depth, social wise. (I did not know many people in the district and saw them only a couple of times a year) AGM time rolled around and I was nominated to be the Vice President by one of my previous employers - I think this was my first ICPA meeting! Certainly my first AGM. All good - 'you don't do much as VP' they all say. Good training for you...bla bla... All was fine till the April meeting where the then President said that she was moving away. Over the crackle of the radio I was not 100% sure what that meant, but soon did when everyone was congratulating me on being President. I was to chair the next meeting as my test run - and the rest is history.

'Daunting' is the word I would use for my feelings back then, but I had SOOOO much help and mentoring and guidance from Kaye Clapin back then, and I think I was a good student, I lapped up the learning of 'good governance 1 on 1'. I also had continuing Secretary Sue Murphy and Treasurer Denise Broad who also gave me great advice and guidance, and of course there was also our State Life Member Jan Heaslip (who is part of our branch) offering sage advice. I stayed in this position for 98/99/00/01/02 (our branch limit is 4 years but the 98 didn't count) I was told that positions on committees runs like this:

Year 1- you learn the position

Year 2- you do something

Year 3- you have fun

I had a few extra years to learn and do something... And I would agree with this extra time, for me, back then anyway.

It is a gradual learning process on how the position works, how it fits in with the other positions and a gaining of confidence; all the while remaining committed to understanding the wider operations of ICPA both at State and Federal level - not to mention learning about people's personalities and developing your own. I also had to learn the difference between P&F, School Council and ICPA and all their processes so that I could understand how things are done in one arena and not another.

You must have attended some interesting meetings over the years; do you have a particular 'stand-out' memory?

I guess the one above would be one and there were others - but they were ones of personality clash and not worth rehashing here in Down the Track. I am sure that all branches and councils have had their fair share of these. I have learnt though that running a meeting effectively, takes a lot of preparation before the meeting. Running a committee takes a lot of communication from all sides and there is a fine line between motivating your troops and running under a 'Hitler style' governance. Perhaps it should read 'make the time to make ICPA sexy without losing its accountability'.

A stand out conference was the 21st State Conference held in Alice Springs in 2003. Although I had attended every State and Federal Conference since 1999, it was my first exposure to a great speaker and very relevant topic - Succession Planning. From this activity we learnt more about our own behaviours and the traits of the people in the room. These types of activities help immensely when dealing with personality issues amongst people - family, staff, and association members. The local ladies who convened the conference were all about having fun for the night's festivities. I have found an old Newsletter with photos and song words rewritten to reflect the ICPA. I think at times we do tend to forget to have fun, while also working hard.

The 2005 Federal Conference also was memorable as I co-convened this and Federal held it in Canberra, for the first time.

I heard you say you've done just about every role on the committee - what role did you enjoy the most, and what have you taken away from sitting in all the positions over the years?

While as President I gradually increased my contact with State Council (to help expand my knowledge of ICPA and help in my new position) and became their Publicity Officer in about 2001. During my role as President the Alice Springs ICPA website was created and I assisted in keeping this going for quite a number of years until we moved to a new system under Federal, in which I also looked after the State Council website as well.

When leaving Alice branch as President I stepped into the State

Council President role and held positions as Newsletter editor, Vice President, President, Secretary and a fill-in Treasurer when required over my time on State. My time on State was for a period of about 13 years in various roles. I also supported many state conference convenors over my time on State Council. While on State I also helped the branch with their own governance; and to mentor the various committee members who came and went (if asked). I saw this as my role as the Branch Public Officer for 9 years. After my time on State I was the Bursary Secretary for a few years also collating all the previous bursary winners into a spreadsheet, so that history was recorded accurately.

My varied roles over the last nearly 20 years working for the branch have come not only in holding positions but for being a support to the branch during meetings and out of meeting when called upon. Fundraising, Bursary development support and reviews, constitution reviews and general governance advice. Sometimes one does not need a 'position' or a label to help, but more the time and effort. The secret is to find what you enjoy doing (or what your members are good at doing) and encourage them to take on roles they are suited for.

Life Membership often has a special meaning to the individual, what does it mean to you?

In 1999, the Alice Springs Branch hosted the State Conference. Back then, this was a big event, 2 days, 3 dinners, 100 odd people... bigger and longer than today. At the State Conference Dinner, I was to award Bev Seidel with the first Alice Springs Branch Life Membership for her efforts to the branch. Bev was the first VISE Co-ordinator for our southern NT area and held this position for 7 years. She had been a member of the branch for 16 and in that time helped the branch with a lot of fundraising. She also attended conferences on behalf of the branch and played an active role at meetings.

I was told, in the letter nominating her for LM that her award nomination was based on her time and commitment to acting positively and professionally for the branch and its members (and others for whom VISE serviced as well). LM is usually awarded when a person has held a position for some time and they are then stepping down, and it is a recognition of their service. It is not to be given away lightly and without due consideration between the membership. There should be an understanding throughout the branch of why this award is being presented.

You are still quite an active member, how would you like to contribute to ICPA as a Life Member?

In our circumstance, a branch Life Member would be across their branch issues and procedures, far better than their State or Federal Councils as we have our own constitution – not all branches do. I see the role of the Life Members, (all 3 of us now) as a bank of history, a place to go to for mentoring as well as someone who may be removed from the current membership, who can give honest, sound and independent advice on bursaries, constitutional issues, branch issues, procedures and policy development. Members, and in particular the executive committee have a lot to take in and manage as ICPA is very dense (and confusing!), most of which is written down somewhere, but knowing where to go to is the first step. Not all issues that come up are written down so there needs to be some sort of guidance from people who can cover these 'grey areas'.

As an addendum to this article, I would like to reflect on the good things that have come from me being involved in ICPA.

- ICPA has given me a good grounding on what to expect from sound governance and procedures. I am on a few other committees and boards and nowhere else does there have the governance and the assistance to new people as the ICPA procedures - you just need to read a lot, and have someone help and decipher. This all takes time. The old saying 'You don't know, what you don't know' is so true. It also helped with business and employing people as well, back before workplace standards.
- It has helped me understand a bit clearer the 'ways of government' – not only the Education dept but all government departments. And become more relaxed when speaking to them. This in turn also helped when dealing with Schools of the Air and boarding schools.
- It has helped me connect with others in a similar position – and this is very important, we all need a 'feel good' moment here and there. Whether this connection was with my neighbours or people from the other side of Australia, it didn't matter.
- It helped my reading, writing and public speaking, simply because I was doing these things more and learning from working with others on papers/media releases, etc. It also helped with my organisational & computer & website skills.
- ICPA also took me away from the station too - but in a good way, to take part in activities that were only for me. Sometimes we all need a 're-refresh' with other adults away from the business and the family.

A closing quote from Mahatma Ghandi, which can be used in so many situations, *(but I am borrowing it from Sue Holder - co state councillor with me in the 2000's who used it in her President's report one year):*

“Be the Change You Want to See”



On Wednesday 31st October State Council had their second face-to-face meeting for the year; the first one was during the June delegations. When preparing the finer details around delegation meetings we've found F2F meetings are better than teleconferences. The 31st of October was also Halloween, a highlight, thanks to Suzanne Wilson's effort. Suzanne is our secretary; she also lives in a swanky spot in Darwin and has the facilities to host our F2F meetings. You can see from the photos that Suzanne went to great lengths to swath us in Halloween; and like usual, the food, bells, whistles and organisation was brilliant... (sending you a special thank you, Suzanne).



To make the most of our meeting times, we invite guests to join us during F2F. We were very pleased Tubby Fudge (COGSO), David Cannon (The Essington International School Darwin), and Marianne St Clair with David Murtagh (CDU) could join and brief us. For parents considering boarding options in the future, keep an eye on The Essington International School Darwin; they have a very high academic record, excellent extra-curricular focus and are running a small-scale boarding facility, with plans to scale up in the future.

One of our F2F meeting agenda items was State Council being more involved with branches, in addition to the reports we provide back and forth, and everyone's willingness to respond to enquiries and other requests. It was agreed one or more State Council members should try to attend each branch meeting and if branches agree, a state NT ICPA report might be read out at each of the AGMs. State Council also agreed to extend an invitation to Branch Presidents, asking them to join us in at least two State Council teleconference each year, and invite them to also give a report on their Branch.

We discussed how tricky it was to fundraise for State Council, although fundraising income is as important to our continuity as it is to any Branch. We explored different fundraising opportunities; including selling a donated beast at the Alice Springs Show Sale and asking members to sell \$50 boards on NT ICPA's behalf.

Another agenda item was deciding on our new tag line, based on entries received during our competition earlier this year. The winner is Kate McMaster, and although it's not exactly what Kate sent in, her entry inspired the final tagline

**NTICPA's New Tag line is
"Equity in Education Outback"**

which NT ICPA will use from now on. Congratulations Kate and thank you everyone for your contribution. Your enthusiasm and loads of entries made it a hard but entertaining selection process!

During delegations, councillors have been staying in an Airbnb house, where we prepare meals and eat-in. This has helped cut down our costs and during these delegations, our Airbnb host was an ICPA supporter who grew up on a cattle station in north west Queensland. Sue gave us a discount and her facilities were perfect.

Our first day of formal meetings was on Thursday. Key points, meetings - Thursday 1 November.

THE HON SELENA UIBO MLA – MINISTER FOR EDUCATION, MINISTER FOR TRAINING together with VICKI BAYLIS, CHIEF EXECUTIVE – DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION



The Minister has agreed that NT ICPA are to have a bi-monthly meeting with the Department, to keep dialogue open, particularly following differences in our understanding of some of the recent issues around boarding including funding arrangements for boarding facilities in the NT, and boarding opportunities available to non-indigenous students.

The Department supports professional development for home tutors and expressed a willingness to facilitate online training sessions for home tutors to better understand dyslexia and (significant) reading difficulties. NT ICPA will provide the Department with NT SOA in-school dates, so the Department can support HT's in accessing and utilising these resources.

The Department advised they will not be able to guarantee one laptop for every DE student. Although this motion outcome did look promising when discussed with the Department during our June delegations, the Department has since reviewed its budget and is not in a position to make such a commitment.

The Department advised a full review of the Isolated Students Assistance Scheme is not imminent, although NT ICPA provided feedback on the policy and scheme in December 2017.

NBN's feedback on the technical aspects of the multi-cast trials were positive, it does work on SkyMuster and NBN will now meet with ASSOA, KSA and NT SDE for the second stage of product trials in 2019. ANT Communications (FSG) was the provider for the trial, when the trial is over all providers will be given the opportunity to tender for the supply.

New corporate and business plans are being rolled out on NBN next year; we probably won't see them in the market till mid next year. Skymuster is more stable than ever, hence the upgrades are happening. NBN has done over 92,000 Skymuster installations since the beginning, including 2,000 in the NT.

Discussions on telehealth port, i.e. unmetered video program to support the families.

Forms for the Interstate Boarding Allowance are not on the Departments web site and there is no area on the form for additional information (such as justification for sending siblings together). NT ICPA expressed the position that members would like the allowance to not be linked solely to curriculum offerings which aren't available in the NT.

As there is a strong focus on indigenous boarding in the NT, the meeting discussed the future for non-indigenous boarding in the NT, and the NT government boarding funding model being so heavily tied to Indigenous student attendance. The Departments position is the Territory loses money when children board interstate, however acknowledged the circumstances of support for indigenous students boarding interstate.

The Department will give NT ICPA a full update on the 'Starting Early for a Better Future' policy at our next meeting. Discussed also, was the KICS funding arrangement—being only secure until June 2019, NT ICPA asked the Department to consider assisting KICS to ensure continuity of funding and therefore the program.

Discussion on increasing population of NT and looking after rural and remote families.

Minister requested more stories about communications/phone/internet problems experienced by rural and remote Territorians. Minister asked NT ICPA to share these stories so they can be taken to the Federal Government.

Tele-health; specialised services for our remote students. NT ICPA asked the relevant Departments to collaborate to enable OT and Speech therapy etc. for rural and remote families.

It doesn't take long to read the main points, but each meeting is a big deal. Securing meetings, preparing and gathering in Darwin takes an awful lot of effort and involves highly influential people. To give you a sense, and not including everyone, this year we have met with 2 Education Ministers and their advisors, the Deputy Leader of the Opposition and Shadow Minister for Education together with her advisor, very senior Department of Education officers - including the Chief Executive Officer, the COGSO President and Chief Executive, senior Telstra and NBN representatives and representatives from Virgin Australia and Qantas.

During each meeting we communicate your motion/s and provide context, that is, to help decision makers understand the back story to why the motion came about. Afterwards, you can fully appreciate how important delegations are, and we hope to continue two delegations a year, budget permitting.

As this DTT issue goes to print, each branch is drafting motions for the 2019 State Conference. You may feel like a broken record submitting the same motion over and over again – but State Council doesn't meet the same people over and over again, certainly not year-to-year. Ministers change, advisors change, departmental officers change. We need to keep telling the story and sharing the motion until it is no longer necessary to do so.

This year NT ICPA MEMBERS had a big win with the Interstate Boarding Allowance. This allowance came about from members writing motions asking for interstate boarding support. It's not the only win; we've seen many changes in ICPA's portfolio landscapes. So when you & your branch draft up a motion about something which really needs to change, feel a little bit proud of yourself. Your efforts do make a difference.

SIBA SHIPS - WELLARD RURAL EXPORTS 'BRIDGING THE GAP' GRANTS PROGRAM

A donation from Siba Ships and the Wellard Rural Export group has allowed NT ICPA to offer the 'Bridging the Gap' Grants program.

WHAT ARE THEY?

These grants shall be awarded in February and August each year to assist in the costs associated for a child to attend an educationally based activity, purchase materials, which are relevant to their current studies or chosen career path or undertake personal development activities.

They are intended to cover course costs, books, equipment, travel and study aids. This is also extended to include activities that relate to student's study course or personal development: leadership skills, information gathering, networking with peers, and course extension activities.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

1. The applicant's family must be geographically isolated and have been a Branch or Lone Member within the NT for at least two years.
2. The applicant must be aged between 15 to 22 years at the 1st January in the year of application.
3. Applicants do not have to be enrolled in fulltime study.

CONDITIONS OF APPLICATIONS

As part of the claim the applicant must provide a 500 word (approx) application which would include:

How are you or your family isolated

Details of family membership with the ICPA in the NT

Details of costs and how the activity or materials that you are applying for will benefit you and what is its relevance to the course you are studying; or your career pathway; or personal development.

Payment will be made in the form of a cheque payable to the successful recipient or guardian, once the application has been deemed successful or alternatively, when a receipt or invoice has been presented to the NTICPA Treasurer, pertaining to the activity or materials from the educational body.

Retrospective applications can be made for an activity or cost associated that has occurred within the previous semester.

The successful applicants will be required to provide a brief written report outlining the content and achievements obtained, for inclusion in the following NTICPA 'Down the Track' Newsletter. (photographs encouraged)

A successful applicant may not apply for consecutive bursaries.

SELECTION PROCESS

All applications will be strictly confidential. The names of the applicants will only be known to the current State Council Assistant Secretary, who will not be eligible to sit on the selection panel.

If in the opinion of the selection panel no suitable application is received, grants will not be awarded and the budgeted amount rolled over into the next semester. Amounts awarded each semester will be decided by the panel, ensuring that any single payment is not under \$750 and with the annual amount available to the grants being reviewed and allocated after each AGM.

The decision of the selection panel will be final. Parents of applicants shall not be eligible to sit on the panel.

CLOSING DATES

January 31st July 30th each year.



Like Haileybury's Melbourne and Beijing campuses, Haileybury Rendall School aims to be a great world school that develops high-achieving students who are connected globally, to each other and their communities.

In Darwin, boarders live in newly refurbished facilities and access one of Australia's most rigorous and rewarding school programs.

Haileybury is among Australia's highest performing schools academically, with consistently high Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) results.

In 2018 Haileybury students achieved their best results in NAPLAN's 11-year history, placing among the top schools nationally. Work and Play

Students complete homework each weeknight after dinner and can access academic staff, GAP students, academic tutors and IT resources.

After school and on weekends, they can join off campus excursions and activities such as waterparks, cinemas, AFL games, fishing, the Botanic Gardens and local markets. Outdoor spaces have been landscaped based on student feedback with socially interactive areas such as fire pits, basketball rings, ponds and gym equipment.

"This is centred on establishing strong positive social relationships and developing an optimistic outlook on the opportunities that education provides," he says. "Our high expectations are based on the mantra that 'Effort is everything and Support is everywhere'.

"HRS boarding offers many wonderful opportunities to the young people of northern Australia. Our boarding staff are caring and experienced; they go above and beyond to ensure that all students are supported."

I dialled the number for the Royal Flying Doctors Service... this morning my daughter was running a temperature of 39.2c, she had severe stomach cramps predominantly on the left-hand side, her pulse was 90bpm and her blood pressure had dropped to 89/53. Every time she moved, she wanted to vomit, she hadn't eaten in two days, her face was red and flushed one moment, then all colour would drain in the next and she'd be white as a ghost. This was the morning of day three and clearly, she wasn't getting better, she was getting worse, I called the RFDS...

Our family live and work on our family's cattle station 'Suplejack Downs' in the Northern Tanami of the Northern Territory. Suplejack is regarded as the most remote cattle station in Australia, but even in this harshest of environments our family love's our life at Suplejack. This country provides for our business, raising beef cattle, it's where we raise our children and a place to replenish our heart and soul. We educate our children to be environmentalists, to love, respect and protect the land they live on.

There are many issues, which the tyranny of distance due to our geographical location, intensifies. Health and medical services are just one of these. A drive to town takes approx. 9 hours in the car depending on the road, which just so happens to be one of the most hostile road surfaces in the country. Our road can be washed away in the wet season or so corrugated in the dry season we joke about the need to wear a mouthguard, so as not to chip your teeth, when driving across it.

So, what do we do when one of our children begins feeling sick? We can't pop up to the doctor's clinic for a check-up and we don't have a GP or hospital just up the street which we can go to for monitoring. We rely on our own intuition, take on the role of nurse as best we can. We make the decisions up until the point when the patient gets better or identifies the need to escalate the situation to an emergency. In an emergency we rely on our medical lifeline in the bush...the Royal Flying Doctors Service!

We've had many emergencies at Suplejack over the years, we're not strangers to the wonderful service of the RFDS. Last year when my nephew was thrown from his horse and was left unconscious, we immediately called the RFDS. My niece was bitten by a snake, we called the RFDS. My father was badly thrown from a colt whilst tailing weaners, again we called the RFDS. In an emergency we call upon the Royal Flying Doctors Service and they have medical professionals and specialist equipment to us in an average of 3 or 4 hours (provided our airstrip isn't 'out' with wet season weather, but that's a whole other story!)

As I dialled the number for the RFDS I thought, just days before Shannai had completed her year 12 studies. We made the 12-hour (one way) trip from Suplejack to Darwin to attend her celebration dinner, she was presented with her NTCET Completers Certificate from the Northern Territory School of Distance Education (NTSDE). Shannai looked stunning in her black, full length dress, her hair lightly curled falling to her shoulders, wearing a pair of gorgeous silver sparkly stiletto shoes, which she was so proud of. Her drop pearl earrings, a graduation gift, framing her beautiful, smiling face and now today she was curled up on the bed in pain...the RFDS doctor answered the phone and I relayed her condition.

They say we raise them tough in the bush, and we most certainly do, but sometimes I wonder if that's a good thing or bad! For the last two days Shannai hadn't left her bed except to make the excruciating walk to the toilet doubled up in grimacing pain, never making a single complaint. I'd been monitoring her closely, keeping an eye on her vitals and nagging her to keep drinking water, which of course meant more frequent walks to the loo, but she obliged without complaint. When I asked her, on a scale from 1 to 10 what is your pain, she would reply, 'about a four'!

By the time the RFDS Retrieval doctor Sam, nurse Mark and pilot Heather arrived, Shannai had put herself into a sleep state to deal with the pain, the painkillers weren't making much difference, only bringing down her temperature a little. Sam finally found a vein, it seems despite all the water she was drinking she was severely dehydrated. A makeshift drip holder was made from a coat hanger attached to the curtain rod and antibiotics were administered. Sam made the diagnosis that it was Shannai's appendix causing her distress and she needed to be medevacked (evacuated) to Alice Springs Hospital.

A week in hospital and Shannai is doing much better. It wasn't just appendicitis, her appendix had actually burst and by all accounts, she is a very lucky young lady. A burst appendix allows bacteria to spread around the abdomen and can cause all kinds of problems and secondary infections. Shannai arrived at the hospital recording an infection indicator in her blood count of over four times the normal limits. Her body had reacted to the burst appendix in a very favourable way though, it isolated the fluid into an abscess on the left-hand side of her abdomen. Which is why most of her pain was on the left when the appendix is actually on the right-hand side.

We are extremely lucky to have the services of the RFDS in the bush, this is a service we don't take for granted. The RFDS relies on donations and support to ensure they can continue to provide medical emergency and primary health care services to Australia's remote and very remote areas. Our family are huge advocates for the Royal Flying Doctors Service and encourage everyone to give when they can. I don't even dare to imagine the outcome if we had to bounce Shannai 730kms over that corrugated dirt road to get her to town for the medical attention she required. Thank goodness for the RFDS!

No boarder at St Philip's College should ever be bored. Heads of Boarding, Ms Marg Stevenson and Mr Sam Muir ensure there are activities and events to keep everyone active, and more importantly, involved in the greater community of Alice Springs, the NT, Australia and the world.

As Marg reflected, "It's been a great year for the St Philip's girl boarders in so many respects and I have felt privileged to be a part of it. One of the highlights was our Jazz and High Tea fundraising event which raised \$4,400 for Drought Relief. Not only did we raise a lot of money, but the girls were exceptional hosts and everyone who came had a wonderful time. Community service is always very high on our agenda, and as well as this event, we raised over \$1000 doing Bob a Jobs for the Fred Hollows Foundation, visited and sang to the residents at Old Timers and supported them by running a face



painting stall at their fete. We've supported the environment by participating in the Alice Springs Town Council's tree planting day, by recycling cans and bottles and cutting down on our use of plastic plates etc for picnics.

Sport, as always, has played an important role in the year and for the first time we have had enough players to enter two basketball teams in the town competition: U16s and Women's B grade. Netball and WAFL run a close second, with many of boarders playing in the town competitions for both these sports. We have also had boarders selected to represent the Northern Territory this year in both these sports. On the weekends we have also had numbers of boarders rising early to take part in Alice Springs Running and Walking events or climbing Mt Gillen. A special well done to the five boarders who completed ten of these events."

The boys are also achieving great things. Head of Boys' Boarding, Sam Muir explained, "This year Pedrea Jackson landed a lead role in the SBS TV show, 'Robbie Hood'. Another

boarder, Charlie Oldfield was successful in his application for exchange to the USA next year, and our three graduating Year 12 boys, Hamish Wark, Philip Sullivan and Imran Mahmood achieved great things, not only this year but throughout their high school career.

Community service plays a big part in boys' boarding as well, and Angus Baty received awards for his sense of community and outgoing and friendly demeanour during his first year in the boarding house. In 2018, during Youth Week, the boys successfully organised and facilitated an inaugural fun run and they are to be commended on their efforts."

At St Philip's College, Alice Springs the focus on community does not remain inside the campus grounds, nor just our local and regional back yards. Our boarders have consistently focused on national and international causes and are to be commended on becoming caring, concerned and proactive global citizens.

NT ICPA POST SECONDARY BURSARY 2019

WHAT IS IT ?

This is a bursary of \$2000 awarded to a child of a current financial ICPA member to assist them with ongoing costs of their Post Secondary Education.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

1. The applicant's family must be geographically isolated and have been a Branch or Lone Member within the NT for at least (2) years.
2. The applicant must be enrolled in full time study at any Tertiary Institution, Agricultural College, an approved TAFE or VET (Vocational Education Training) Course, or undertaking a Traineeship or Apprenticeship which must be of at least one year duration.

CONDITIONS OF APPLICATIONS

The Degree/Course, Traineeship/Apprenticeship to commence within two (2) years of completing their Post Secondary/Tertiary schooling.

An applicant who has previously been awarded the NT ICPA Post Secondary Bursary or the former NT ICPA Tertiary Scholarship will not be eligible to apply again.

A written report is to be provided for presentation at the Annual Conference, on how funding was utilised.

ADMINISTRATION OF BURSARY

This Bursary is administered by ICPA NT State Council.

SELECTION PROCESS

All applications will be strictly confidential. Where more than one applicant meets the selection criteria, assessment of all information provided would contribute towards selection. If in the opinion of the selection panel no suitable application is received, the Bursary will not be awarded. The decision of the selection panel will be final.

SELECTION CRITERIA

These criteria must be presented in a neat, concise and well laid out format. All selection criteria must be completed.

1. How you are geographically isolated?
2. Details of family membership with ICPA in the NT.
3. Summary of schooling history.
4. Why I chose the place of study (Degree/Course) or employment (Traineeship/Apprenticeship)
5. 500 word essay: ***'If I was the recipient of the ICPA Post Secondary Bursary, how it will benefit me and what would the Bursary be used for?'***

Document that includes Points 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 from the **Selection Criteria**, as detailed above.

School Leavers of current year: Copy of last High School report AND/OR Reference from teacher.

Proof of current enrolment/ employment at any Tertiary Institution, Agricultural College, TAFE/VET course, Traineeship or Apprenticeship.



BOILED PINEAPPLE FRUITCAKE

We all love to eat – and for some the cooking process is therapy too – for Sarah collecting cook books is part of the process.

I am a bit of a cook book collector. Mostly I love the really, old cook books, I don't think there was such a thing as recipe books until more recently, maybe it changed with the multicultural influence in Australia, I actually don't know. The old English 'cook books' make amazing cooking with the most basic ingredients, such as steamed jam pudding or a date cake that tastes like its full of caramel.

I search Op Shops and lawn sales with my fingers crossed to find such books, but they are as rare as hen's teeth. I'm guessing 'recipe' books became more popular in Australia the 1980's because that's the most common era of recipe book that people are getting rid of.

My most treasured cook books were left to me by my maternal Grandmother, the shortest, funniest lady I ever knew. My next love is recipe books by bush women, which are usually along the same lines - using basic ingredients to make a great feed. The Broken Hill SOA book has been advertised on Facebook for a while, so when I saw it at Federal Conference, I grabbed a copy. Today I was trying to recall the measurements to my favourite Pineapple Fruit Cake recipe, but I thought, blow it, I'll make a different fruit cake, and reached for this book. To my surprise, the recipe I was looking for was also in the book, contributed by 'Jacinta Cullen from Avenel Station!' If you're looking for an easy fruit cake, this is one of my 'go-to's'. I highly recommend the **BOOTS OFF, Apron On - Broken Hills School of the Air Cookbook**. There you go - it's even a 'cook book'!

Boiled Pineapple Fruit Cake

*470g can crushed pineapple
500g mixed fruit
125g butter
1 cup sugar
1 tsp mixed spice
1 tsp bi-carb soda
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 cup self-raising flour
1 cup plain flour*

*Preheat oven to moderately slow 160 degrees.
Combine undrained pineapple, mixed fruit, butter, sugar, spice and bi-carb in pan. Stir over heat until sugar dissolves, then bring to the boil for 3 minutes. Allow to cool, then add eggs and sifted flour. Mix well. Spread in prepared tin and bake in a moderately slow oven for 1-1.5 hours. Allow to completely cool before removing it from the tin.*

Horses for Courses Charity Bush Ride Glen Helen Homestead to Alice Springs

Wow...What a whirlwind 'Horses for Courses' event it was this year. The 'Charity Ride for Bush Kids' kicked off Sunday 7th October, after an amazing meet and greet dinner at the Glen Helen Homestead Lodge, the previous evening.

15 Horse riders and 5 support crew joined the adventure, riding between 19 and 34 kilometers each day, winding along the spectacular West MacDonnell Ranges, camping under the stars each night.

Six days later we all rode onto Alice Springs Town Council lawns, greeted with a mayoral welcome and sausage sizzle. A celebration dinner and auction was held later that evening at the Star of Alice function centre.

Over the last couple of years, *Horses for Courses* have chosen to support a charity which resonates with our own ideals and beliefs. Last year all profits were donated to Northern Territory Isolated Children's Parents' Association (NT ICPA). This year we chose to support *Dolly's Dream* and assist in their campaign to stamp out bullying and to create empathy and resilience in young people.

Bush kids, along with their families face many challenges, be it:

- Sitting in a car for up to 12 hours, one way, to attend School events.
- Not having the opportunity to play afterschool sports as part of a team.
- Not being able to participate in dance, swimming or music lessons, athletics, or after school tutoring.
- Not having easily obtainable access to medical, dental or specialists' services.
- Having limited telecommunication and road network services. Annual weather conditions result in families not being able to get to town for days or weeks due to dirt roads being partly or completely washed away.
- Social and emotional wellbeing for teenagers living in the bush is a very real ongoing concern because there are limited opportunities for face to face social interactions. This can impact on a teenager's developing sense of self.
- Distance Education & School of the Air Challenges
- Boarding School Blues

It's very easy to feel socially and emotionally isolated when you live in rural and remote Australia. Through the *Horses for Courses* 'Charity Ride for Bush Kids' we endeavour to connect families in the bush by reassuring them, they are not alone.

We also aim to keep conversations about these issues flowing, through a focus on creating a *country/city connect*. Through our *Horses for Courses* programs we're helping to close the divide and rekindle empathy between city and country.

We believe by sharing stories with people right across

Australia, including those who have never experienced living in remote locations, helps to break down barriers and create connectedness. So please get involved, help to spread the word with family, friends and your greater communities.

On this year's *Horses for Courses, Charity ride for Bush Kids* we had 11 children riding horses. They travelled from Queensland, remote NT and Alice Springs. It was a great effort by their families to get them to Glen Helen and enable them to experience this epic adventure.



Our youngest little cowgirl, Matilda C (5ys old) and her cousin Callum (6yrs old) shared Matilda's pony 'Feedback Jack' to ride every step of the 135kms...What amazing little champions!

The week long ride was filled with serenity, adventure and fun. We got rained on (not once but twice), had an absolute ball with our beautiful horses and on occasion took the long way around, we didn't get lost, but the terrain made for some innovative trail riding. As we all rode along, we sang songs, played games; answered quiz's, absorbed our incredible surrounds and thoroughly enjoyed every step of the way.

Evening activities included campfire sing-alongs, boot-scooting boogie with some country line dancing, bush poetry, a Parks and Wildlife ranger session with Phil Cowan, a canvas painting session with Carolyn Sandaver, from InSpireEx Art Rockhampton and plenty of good old fashion country hospitality with camp-oven cook ups and some of the best campfire cooking imaginable, by Shane and Elai Pugh and Carolyn.

Sophie Pugh, a bush kid herself, serenaded us with her ukulele picking music. She also outlined some educational challenges facing families in the bush, through a song she composed herself. What a talented and amazing young lady!

A heartfelt thank you to all our wonderful sponsors, volunteers and supporters, who through their generous contributions continue to enable *Horses for Courses* to get on with the job of raising awareness of the issues facing Aussie bush kids and their families. Without you we would not be able to do what we do.

Thank you equally, to everyone who donated their time and energy selflessly, especially Donna Digby, Shane Muldoon, Carissa Read, the CWA ladies who spoilt us with some fine dining at Simpsons Gap and to my amazing family who make themselves available to support and lend a hand in every way possible.
