Telstra round table discussion.

In November Kate Greenfield attended a Telstra round table discussion on behalf of SA ICPA in Port Augusta. Kate has summarised the discussions for our members.

I came in late as I had down for a 10.30am start and they started at 10am. Luckily I got there at 10.20am to make sure I could get a coffee! So only missed the first little bit and they were discussing that Innaminka is to get the small cells for mobile coverage. In the round 4 of the mobile black spots project Telstra is seeking co-investment. Rowan said that if Liberals don't get reelected it's unlikely there will be a round 5.

Yagi's etc that are used to ex-

tend mobile coverage will be the financial responsibility of individual users

Regional and remote users now have a dedicated call centre half of which is based in Adelaide. It works on billing address details. This works off the standard 13 22 00 number. I should have asked if this covers Port Augusta addresses as I've spoken to Telstra call centres of late and they seem a lot more remote than Adelaide.

We dedicated considerable time to identifying ways that Telstra could better communicate with rural and remote users. Telstra were hungry to find ways of better communicating with their users and I feel we all had a very receptive audience with Telstra. In these discussions I put forward the following on behalf of ICPA (in no particular order):

• The future beyond radio telephones:

• VOIP or small cells

• Telstra is currently conducting a trial in the NT using VOIP. VOIP using pre-existing broadband satellite (for example I am on the Skymuster satellite with Activ8 as my service provider, Telstra expects me to piggy back a VOIP on top of this). I highlighted to Telstra that this is something that ICPA does not support as it puts all our telecommunications into the one basket and if that system fails we would be left without any form of telecommunications at all.

• Improving the website so that information provided includes forecasting of where new mobile towers are to go within regions in the next 12 months so that we are more aware of our options and opportunities to come.

• Improving the website so that if when you look at the clickable coverage map there is info to the side that will help you navigate through to the extension coverage devices (Yagis etc)

• Utilize email to provide with a quarterly update especially around the way new technology can enhance our Telstra experience. This is something Telstra was keen to speak to all

It was a full day of business for attending councillors covering issues of travel and education allowances, SOTA discussions regarding communications received back from the Ministers office. • It was suggested that Telstra also attend our various NRM field days and bring their tech with them

• I suggested that they have available in the Port Augusta Telstra Shop both the Yagis and the Telstra 2go units as well as staff that understand them and can talk about the merits of the products.

Telstra spoke about the Internet of Things https://www.telstra. com.au/business-enterprise/ solutions/internet-of-things/ iot-coverage If you can get on this it will be a game changer. Apparently it is so much bigger than the 3 and 4G networks and covers approx. 3.5million km2. Telstra are to release some kind of new smart phone that will run on this network and were looking for 10 people from SA ICPA network to 'test it to its limits'. To date I have put this idea out to Scott and Amanda Michael to date as Scott is very tech savvy - runs businesses over a vast area of outback SA and is very willing to report back to us with his experiences. We still need to put forward 9 more candidates. The internet of things needs to be available at least partly to any one we put forward.

Sky Muster, Distance Education and the Education Port.

If you are in a designated Sky Muster area and have a home school room and;

1. Your students are geographically isolated and attend School of the Air or Open Access College or

2. Your students are Home Schooled and are receiving either AIC for geographical isolation or medical;

you may be eligible for an Education Port on your Sky Muster satellite service. Each eligible Reception to Year 12 student will be allocated 50 Gb per month at a favourable cost. Up to 3 students can be catered for under a standard configuration. If there are more than 3 students, special arrangements will be made.

Not all Retail Service Providers (RSPs) offer the Education port, some that do are,

If your school room is separate from the building where the domestic SkyMuster service is located, you may be eligible for an additional Sky Muster installation for the school room.

In South Australia, Open Access College will assist with internet costs for your SOTA student/s. Please contact OAC Marden for more information, or if attending SOTA Induction week please ask.

Students attending Kindy via RICE (who are geographically isolated) are also eligible for the Education Port.

Sky Muster Plus is here this year.

ICPA members can look forward to taking advantage of the new Sky Muster Plus plans. You can find more out by accessing the NBNCO website, or head to BIRRRAUS (Better Internet for Rural Regional & Remote Australia), then look for their NBN Satellite tab to read more detailed information.

To help meet the ever growing need for data, Sky Muster is launching a new service, Sky Muster Plus. NBNCO have released the following information on the two key improvements being made through this product evolution:

• More data capacity – Data allowance exemptions will be provided for key functional uses of the nbn access network. This means that at a wholesale level, nbn will not count the use of essential internet services – including email, general web-browsing and common critical smartphone and PC operating system software updates – towards monthly data allowances. Terms and conditions apply

• Enjoy supplementary burst above the wholesale download speed – This new product will help deliver faster download speeds by providing access to a wholesale 25Mbps product that, furthermore can now boost above 25Mbps when applications and network support allows. This may help key software and services to deliver even better performance. Terms and conditions apply

What this means for an average user is that when they exhaust their monthly data allowance, wholesale download speeds will not be slowed down for regular web activities like accessing emails or internet banking. Activities such as gaming and video streaming will continue to contribute towards the overall monthly data limit of users and, once the cap is reached, will be speed-shaped down as they are now. Drought – My school assembly speech.

Hi, I'm Anna and I live on a station between Roxby downs and Coober Pedy. My family have had stations in the area for over 100 years. Our station called Billa Kalina is around 7000 square kilometres or 700 000 hectares. We normally run around 4000 short horn cattle and around 12000 dorper sheep which are organic for the Australian and overseas markets.

As you would have heard in the media over the past few months drought is affecting large areas of Australia. Our property is located in the driest part of South Australia which is the driest state in Australia. Our average rainfall per year is about 140 ml which is about a quarter of what Adelaide gets. My family has always had to deal with lack of rainfall on our properties. Over the years we have purPrince Harry was lucky enough to meet RFDS (SE section) Board member, Sanchia Treloar of Yarramba Station – at Dubbo in 2018

chased several other properties to help move livestock around when drought arrives. I realise not every farmer can do this, however the key to our ongoing success is acting early and not waiting and hoping for rain. The condition of our land is our number one priority.

Buying in hay and feed is not an option for us due to the size of our property and distance from hay suppliers. Our strategy is to move the livestock off our land to our other properties or sell them whilst they are still in a strong condition. So far this year we have only had 21ml of rain, so we are down to about half of our normal number of sheep and cattle. At home we have moved 2500 cattle off the station this year and will continue to do so until it rains. So that's basically sending a truck away every week for this year. We have always tried to spend money on infrastructure such as new pipelines and troughs in the good years to set us up

when dry years come. This enables us to spread our livestock out across the station to ensure small numbers on each water point.

It's difficult to live in it when it's really dry at home. Think about a super windy day here, imagine that but with dust blowing all day filling up the water troughs with sand that we've just cleaned out for the cattle and sheep. Sometimes the dust is that bad that you can only see a metre in front of you. This is especially bad at this time of year as it's generally windier in Spring. This takes its toll emotionally of everyone living in it.

Stress on owners, managers and workers on the land is a big issue in times of drought. No matter how well-prepared farmers are it is still very hard to see the land dry and having to sell livestock that have been selectively breed for markets. I know that during this time my dad is very stressed and is continuously having to be worry about which dam is going dry next and where those cattle are going to go.

There will always be drought somewhere in Australia due to the size of our county. It just generally gets more coverage when it's in the eastern states as there are more farmers affected by the issue. It is not just farmers and their employees who are affected by drought, local towns and their business suffer due to the lack of excess money to spend.

During this current drought my family have mainly sold livestock but the issue with this is that when it does eventually rain it will usually rain in other places too which will result in the price of stock going up, so it is hard to buy back in.

Even though drought creates hard times for farmers, the good times do come and that's why my family continues to do what we do.



ficer.



However, as the months roll past and I get to know our small North West community better, the support and inspiration I see between everyone makes me realise this distance was never an issue! And I think we are pretty lucky to be very much a part of it.

Now hopefully I don't fill those boots up with red dust and I can find some typing skills somewhere within!! Husband is now on the roof fixing the air-conditioner, mad bugger it must be 60 degrees up there, the sun has started to set behind the trees, allowing some shade to fall over the pool, great chance to cool the kids down without the third degree burns.....ah station life!!

The girls attend Seaview Christian College in Port Augusta, which is a 45km drive from home to school. As their Mum, I do this trip 4 times a day (180kms a day). Imogen is in grade 2 and Sienna, grade 1. Our normal day "plan" is to leave home by 7.30am and arrive at school around 8.15am. School starts at 8.30am and finishes at 3pm. The girls have a uniform they have to wear each day. 3 days a week they have formal dress and 2 days a week is sports uniform. It saves the arguments on what they have to wear each day but school shoes and white socks do not stay clean out here! They have just begun packing their own lunch boxes, which they think is a huge novelty and Mum thinks is great – one less thing to do in the morning for me!

There were many reasons why we chose to send our girls to Port Augusta for schooling. The first one is, we are lucky to be close enough to town to make is viable to do so. Followed closely by that we believe social interaction with other peers their age is important. Before they begun school, their days were filled in with water runs and hanging with us adults. We discussed the choices of doing School of the Air and getting a governess, but as the girls and I would rather be out in the paddock than stuck in a classroom at home, I knew teaching at home would be a struggle for us all – especially me. So hence the daily commute to town begun when the girls began school.

A lot of people comment on the travel we do and then wonder what I do during the day. According to them, I must get bored out on the station with nothing to do! As you would all know, there is always plenty to do on a station! The travel doesn't bother me, I guess I realised that it has to be done and I don't mind the "me time" in the car with my tunes cranked! It takes 3 hours out of my day, every day. Once the girls are dropped off at school, my role as "Jack of all trades" begins. Everyday is different and can involve picking up supplies from somewhere in town (I always expect a phone call after I've left home in the morning), followed by checking waters, cleaning troughs and due to the dry season, pulling out bogged sheep as dams went dry. Then the usual fun stuff called housework, bookwork and cooking that is never ending. Before I know it, its 2.15pm and its back off to town I go.

Our school bus is a dual cab ute, which Scott kindly equipped with a trough broom, shovel, duct tape and some rope! Most days the dogs come on the school run with us too. Shearing, crutching and lamb marking time, like for everyone, is a busy time. Our girls love being down the yards and amongst it (and me too!). If they get ready for school without the usual carry on, do their homework, eat their dinner and go to bed when asked, they are rewarded with one day off for each week of shearing (usually goes for 4 weeks). The days they get off are spent down the yards drafting sheep or out mustering with Dad. It's amazing how good they can be during the busy times!!

Rain days are a huge deal for the girls, not just the fact we need the rain, but if we get more than 15ml, I don't bother sloshing my way to town and the girls get to stay home to jump in puddles! Imogen will try convince me that any drop rain is a good excuse to stay home!!

We are happy with the education the girls are receiving in Port Augusta, the days are long for them, but they are in a great school (only 70 students from Reception to Year 7) happy and learning. To those that are teaching their children from home, I think you are amazing! When attending ICPA conferences, I am in awe of you Mum's and wonder how I'd cope doing what you do. *Amanda Michael*

Cambodia

For the year 10 trip this year, Seymour College decided to do a service trip to Cambodia. All the students had to raise \$250 for the trip to help build a house in Cambodia. We were going there for two weeks, and along with service we were getting to see this beautiful country. I was allowed to with my parent's permission, but I had to pay for the trip (approximately \$1500) by myself, which I found was good in that I was being more independent.

The trip was in September, near the end of term 3, but all throughout the year up to that point there was a lot of preparing being done by the school and ourselves. Some of our subjects, such as history and SOJ (learning development) were highly focused on Cambodia and worked toward getting a better understanding of the country before were went. This also gave us time to raise our money from the fundraising. This money went toward buying plants for a family's crops, which we later planted, and materials for building a house which we later built. I decided to set up a food stall in Kimba and sell vegetables from the garden, baked goods and preserves. During the day I was out working for crutching so Mum helped me in making goods to sell, then when I came home I made more. The stall was a huge success and ended up bypassing the goal making a total of \$488.75. To actually pay the expense of going, over the years I have saved money from working in a special account to use in the future. I used this and the money I saved throughout the year to pay for my journey. It was a bit nerve-racking sitting in the airport as I had never been overseas before, and I was going without my parents, but I was excited none the less.

When the plane touched down, I could hardly believe that I was actually there. We left the airport and met our guide for the trip, Khon, then got onto buses that would take us to dinner. The atmosphere was so different to Australia. The roads were packed with traffic, which were mostly motorbikes, ducking in and out, in-between

cars and buses. The streets were lively and bright, markets along the roads selling produce and street food. I couldn't believe how hot and humid the air was, compared to Australia's dry heat. I immediately fell in love with this country. Although a beautiful and amazing country, Cambodia has a fair share of problems. As a result of the rule of Pol Pot, who committed mass genocide of his own people and set Cambodia back years, they are still struggling with the consequences. There are huge gaps in wealth, so you could see a towering hotel, but right next to it would be a small shack that people are trying to sell things out of to make a living. Although we had learnt

about things like this before we went, there is a big difference between hearing about it and seeing it with your own eyes. This was also the case when we went and saw S21 and the killing fields of Pol Pot's time. Seeing the place where thousands of people were tortured and slaughtered was a very difficult thing to see.

We started off our trip in the capital city of Phenom Penn, and then traveled to Siam Reap. Along with S21 and the killing fields, we also visited Free the Bears where we learnt about what they were doing to protect the endangered species of Sun and Moon bears, and the other animals they were keeping. We only spent 4 days in Phenom Penn before we went to Siam Reap, where we did most of our service, but also some sight-seeing. In Siem Reap, we rode the Tuk Tuks around the city on our first day, giving us our first good look at the city. Most of the ancient Temples are around Siem Reap, so we got to see many of them, even going into the famous, Angkor Wat. We rode bikes to these temples because it was more in the countryside, and was really nice being down in the surroundings. We rode the bikes to where this family was living, which is where we helped them plant the crops of mainly mango and dragon fruit trees. One of the days we went up into the jungle, of which there is not much left in Cambodia due to deforestation, where we trekked up the mountain and saw statues and learned about the Hindu religion. Hindu used to be the main religion of Cambodia, but it is now Buddhism, which is why there are many old Hindu temples and statues. For the last four days we spent our time on the house building. There were four groups of us, split into our clan (sports team) groups. We met the family of the house we were building for, a couple and their three-year-old son. Some of the locals also came to help build the house with us. The work was hard, especially in the humidity, but when we finished it was definitely worth it to see the smiles of the family who we had helped. There was a ceremony for the house and it was blessed by the monks who came, a priest tied a piece red string around all of our wrists, which is Lucky Red Buddha string that is meant to bring you good luck.

Getting on the plane to go back to Australia was a very bittersweet moment, but I know I won't forget the time I had spent in Cambodia. The people I met where so amazing, and it really makes you think, these people who have so little are so kind and friendly, but where we live where we have so much, people can be so grumpy and unsatisfied with what they have. However there are many people who are doing their best to help in many different ways as well! Going there gave me such a new perspective on life, and I feel that I will definitely go back and volunteer in the future.

QPR training

QPR is designed to provide everyday people with three simple steps to help save a life from suicide.

- How to ask the suicide question

Lemon Baked Cheesecake Jess Barry

250g Biscuits 150g Butter, melted 500g Cream Cheese 3/4 tsp Lemon rind 1/4 cup lemon juice 3 eggs Preheat oven to 160 degrees. Process biscuits, mix in melted butter and press into spring form pan and chill for 15 minutes. Beat cream cheese, sugar, lemon juice and rind. Beat in eggs one at a time. Pour into case. Bake for 50 minutes and chill for 4 hours.

Homemade Cream Cheese (AKA Labneh) Jess Barry

1 kg full fat plain yogurt

Line a sieve with a large cheesecloth or new chux wipe and pour the whole tub of yogurt in. Allow to strain for 12 -24 hours. Catch the whey in a bowl and put aside and use to add to mayo or pesto etc, will act as a preserve and add a month on your homemade mayo.

Store cream cheese/labneh in the fridge for up to a month and use it as a replacement of store brought cream cheese. Cheesecakes, mix with icing sugar to top cakes, alternative for mayo. Entertaining - place teaspoon scoops in olive oil, with garlic, chilli and fresh herbs, allow to marinate for 20 minutes, serve with crackers, similar to goats cheese.

SETTING UP A DEVICE SAFELY FOR KIDS

Self Watering Wicking Garden Beds

We all know its dry and water is scarce, we could all do with a good rain, homestead dams drying up, leaving us with limited alternative water supplies.

A lovely neighbour who had a fabulous green thumb in the garden shared a tip with me a few years ago, self watering wicking beds. They are basically containers with water reservoirs at the base, like a giant self watering pot. Moisture is drawn up through the soil via a process called capillary action or wicking. This allows moisture to be more evenly distributed through the soil, creating better soil conditions for the plants..

It didn't take my neighbour long to convince me how great these beds where, her vegetable patch was lush, green and over productive, she was feeding the station and us every week!

The dry conditions have forced me to get moving and make some more wicking beds to completely replace my existing vegetable patch, so we can still enjoy home grown vegetables in these dry times.

Build a vegetable bed. IBCs (intermediate bulk containers), wooden boxes, brick or corrugated iron raised beds or the most accessible old corrugated rain water tanks (cut to size). If bed option is not water tight, line with good quality plastic or pond liner to the top. Total depth of the bed should be around 50-60cm high, allowing 20-30cm for water the water reservoir and 30 cm for the depth of soil. If your bed is only 30cm high, your reservoir layer could be dug down 20-30cm, as long as the overflow point is at soil level.

Step 2.

Line it. If using wooden crate use carpet to prevent splinters piecing the plastic lining. For corrugated iron tanks we just used cardboard. Fit in liner, then fill with water before you add scoria and soil to ensure that there is no leaks.

Step 3.

Fit an overfill pipe. Insert this at the level of the join of the soil and reservoir, on the opposite side from the water inlet. This allows excess water from the rain to run out, preventing water logging.

Step 4.

Add 2.5cm layer of around 12mm scoria or gravel to the base.

Step 5.

Create a fill pipe. Install a length of 50mm PVC pipe vertically, attached to a PVC 90 degree elbow that will sit near the base of the bed, on top of the scoria. Next attach a length of 50mm slotted flexible agricultural drainage pipe or 50mm pipe with holes drilled into it to the elbow, running this along the middle of the bed and adding a cap to the end.

Step 6.

Cover Pipe and the bottom of the bed with scoria, to a depth of 20-30cm. Then cover the scoria with a layer of geotextile fabric that acts as a wick while stopping fine sol particles from filling the reservoir. Step 7.


Fill the top half of the bed (approximately 30cm) with a blend of good quality organic soil and compost. Sheep manure and compost works well also. Step 8.

Using a hose, pour water into the PVC pipe to fill reservoir at the bottom. You can use a garden stake as a dipstick to see how deep water is. Initially you need to water from the top as well, to wet the soil for the first

time. Step 9.

Once the soil is damp, the bed is ready for planting. For the first week or so, you may need to water young vegetable seedling from above until their roots are big enough to start wicking.

Kiwi Co. Crates Review



Aurelia and James Reynolds, Upalinna Station, Flinders Ranges Branch. Aurelia's favourite part of making the kaleidoscope crate was sticking the shapes on the clear disc where ever she wanted, and they still made beautiful patterns through the view finder.

About seven months ago, I chanced upon Kiwi Co. crates as I was scrolling through facebook and saw an ad pop up. I clicked on it and discovered these great boxes full of STEAM goodness! STEAM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Maths. The crates contain hands on science and art projects delivered for ages 0 - 16. Kiwi Co. is a team of educators, makers, engineers, and rocket scientists (yes, for real). And they're passionate about what they do.

How it works:

- 1. Pick a Line. They offer projects for every age and interest!
- 2. Delivered Monthly. Choose your plan and the first crate ships in 2 days. Pause or cancel anytime.
- 3. Serious Fun! The science and art projects inspire kids to become creative problem solvers.

My kids get so excited when they see the brown and green box in the mailbag. They take it out straight away and go into their room and start making.

Initially, I thought I'll just get one crate per month for both of my kids to share. I thought if it turned out to be a good resource, I'd purchase another subscription so they'd each have their own crate. Seven months on and I have renewed the subscription still with the one crate as I discovered that both of my kids worked really well together on the one project. They also go really quiet when they are making. At first, I was worried because I'm sure you'd agree that prolonged silence from children usually means they're up to something... and it's usually no good! But I found them so engrossed in the project and working as a team. Each of them building or making part of the project that interested them, whether it was the colouring and decorating or the construction. My oldest would read out the instructions and felt very important.

I can't rave enough about these crates. Not only is there the STEAM component, but the crates also build confidence, encourage team building, critical thinking and leadership. I have been on

hand to help. However, so far, I have not been needed. The instructions are really clear and easy to follow and my kids love that they can complete the projects without the help of an adult.

Best of all, the crates are really convenient. You don't need to research and then go and buy the supplies needed. The crates have everything you need (plus extras) to start straight away. They are delivered by mail every month and all the projects have a different focus from one another. These crates are perfect for those of us who live in remote areas but still want our kids to have access to the best resources out there.
